

The FY2009 Annual HAWC Operating Budget approved by the Board Members on April 10, 2008 is \$12,020,113

Major budget categories are:

Plant Maintenance and Operations Cost - \$953,000 Electricity - \$1,878,000 Chemicals - \$2,200,000 Miscellaneous/Other - \$4,862,000 Drinking Water Operations Personnel (included in the PUD Budget) - \$1,278,513

Payments made to the HAWC are based on actual monthly Operations and Maintenance costs.

The FY2008 Annual HAWC Operating Budget was \$23,351,450. The difference in the FY2008 and FY2009 budget amounts is due to the Public Works Department taking over the operations and maintenance of the Northeast Water Purification Plant from the HAWC contractor MWH Constructors. These operations and maintenance costs will now be paid through the PWE operating budgets. Additionally, the debt service on bonds related to the Northeast Water Purification Plant is now paid from the Combined Utility System rather than as part of the HAWC budget.

It is recommended that City Council approve the proposed FY 2009 Annual Operating Budget for the Houston Area Water Corporation in the amount of \$12,020,113

- a. On-premise signs no larger than 6 square feet in size, and no more than 5 feet in height, that display only business names or logos, setting forth the location of or directions to parking or buildings located on the premises, or regulating the flow of the on-premise traffic. Such directional signs may be lighted, consistent with the other requirements for electrical signs in this chapter and with the requirements of the Construction Code. Such directional signs shall be limited to a maximum of two in number for each entrance utilized for vehicular access to the business premises.
- b. Institutions of higher education and medical institutions may utilize a single directional sign per entrance in lieu of the two signs permitted above, provided such sign is no larger than 25 square feet in total size and no more than 8 feet in height, or no larger than 30 square feet in total size and no more than 6 feet in height; any illumination is indirect; and no more than 20 percent of the sign surface is devoted to the logo or entity name. Electronic signs, spectacular signs, and changeable message signs are prohibited. A sign permit is required.

City of Houston, Texas, Ordinance No. 200

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE HOUSTON SIGN CODE RELATING TO DIRECTIONAL AND LOCATIONAL SIGNS FOR INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND MEDICAL INSTITUTIONS; CONTAINING FINDINGS AND OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE FOREGOING SUBJECT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

* * * * *

WHEREAS, large institutions of higher education require multiple points of entry to accommodate members of the student body on a day-to-day basis as well as to accommodate high volumes of visitors on a periodic basis for symposiums, theatrical performances, sporting events, and the like; and

WHEREAS, state institutions of higher education are not restricted by the limitations of the City's Sign Code regarding directional and locational signage, and have utilized signage that in some instances is somewhat more effective for large campus purposes; and

WHEREAS, large medical institutions require multiple points of entry because of the specialized facilities and multiple destination points located across the campus; and

WHEREAS, it is especially important for large medical institutions to have effective directional signage because of the need to direct emergency vehicles and personnel as well as family members speedily but safely to emergency rooms for lifesaving services; and

WHEREAS, effective locational and directional signage for such large campus institutions is important to the overall traffic flow of vehicles, not only on the campus of such institutions, but also for adjacent streets, thoroughfares, and feeder roads; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor's Task Force on On-Premise Signage has studied the locational and directional signage needs of large campus medical institutions and institutions of higher education and has recommended that provisions for alternative locational and directional signage be included in the City's Sign Code to accommodate the unique traffic demands of such institutions; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the findings contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are determined to be true and correct and are hereby adopted as a part of this Ordinance.

Section 2. That Section 4602 of Houston Sign Code (Chapter 46 of that volume of the City of Houston Construction Code known as the City of Houston Building Code) is hereby amended by adding, in the appropriate alphabetical order position, new definitions that read as follows:

"INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION shall mean a private or independent institution of higher education, as defined in Section 61.003(15) of the Texas Education Code, located on a single campus comprising an area in excess of twenty acres and located within the corporate limits of the city. In determining the size of the campus, areas containing dedicated streets shall be included as part of the campus."

"MEDICAL INSTITUTION shall mean one or more facilities located on a single campus comprising an area in excess of twenty acres located within the corporate limits of the city, and dedicated to the prevention and treatment of illness and disease and the preservation of good health through the services of medical, nursing or allied health professionals recognized by the American Medical Association. In determining the size of the campus, areas containing dedicated streets shall be included as part of the campus."

Section 3. That Item (8) of Subsection (b) of Section 4605 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"(8) Directional and Locational Signs

- a. On-premise signs no larger than 6 square feet in size, and no more than 5 feet in height, that display only business names or logos, setting forth the location of or directions to parking or buildings located on the premises, or regulating the flow of the on-premise traffic. Such directional signs may be lighted, consistent with the other requirements for electrical signs in this chapter and with the requirements of the Construction Code. Such directional signs shall be limited to a maximum of two in number for each entrance utilized for vehicular access to the business premises.
- b. Institutions of higher education and medical institutions may utilize a single directional sign per entrance in lieu of the two signs permitted above, provided such sign is no larger than 25 square feet in total size and no more than 8 feet in height, or

no larger than 30 square feet in total size and no more than 6 feet in height; any illumination is indirect; and no more than 20 percent of the sign surface is devoted to the logo or entity name. Electronic signs, spectacular signs, and changeable message signs are prohibited. A sign permit is required."

Section 4. That, if any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this Ordinance that no portion hereof or provision or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality, voidness or invalidity of any other portion hereof, and all provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable for that purpose.

Section 5. That there exists a public emergency requiring that this Ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction as requested in writing by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall be passed finally on such date and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.





SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has awarded ten major urban areas around the country grants to engage in Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Planning. The regions were selected based upon their high risk and potential impact on the nation's collective security and resilience. Funds are intended to be used to:

1. Fix shortcomings in existing plans

2. Build regional planning processes and planning communities, and

3. Link operational and capabilities-based planning for resource allocation.

In Houston, this planning will focus on two scenarios – a Category 5 hurricane and a catastrophic, multi-IED incident. One of the primary deliverables of this planning engagement will be a region-wide coordination plan that addresses the entire homeland security percentage of the protection – response – recovery). Pandemic Influenza planning will be the focus of this planning with FY2009 grant funds (an additional \$3 million anticipated in summer 2009).

REGIONAL CATASTROPIC PLANNING TEAM

Pursuant to grant requirements, we have convened a Regional Catastrophic Planning Team comprised of public and private sector representatives. The group includes the direct or indirect representation of jurisdictions across the 13-county H-GAC region, and of applicable disciplines (law enforcement, fire, EMS, public health, emergency management, etc.). To ensure that our plans achieve not only horizontal integration across jurisdictions in our region but also vertical integration, the team is supplemented with state and federal partners. An extensive contingent of subject matter experts, planners and other staff support are also engaged in this broad initiative. School districts, nonprofit agencies, 9-1-1 public safety answering points, and other entities will also be engaged in this planning effort.

MATCH REQUIREMENT

The grant requires a 25% local cash or in-kind match. The City of Houston is serving as the grant's local fiscal agent and will administer subrecipient agreements to regional partners for the grant's use. Before a contract or subrecipient agreement is signed, City of Houston staff will provide a detailed plan to council for meeting match requirements.

Adequate in-kind contributions will be secured to meet the grant's match requirement. Current in-kind match funding include City of Houston and regional partner staff time for meeting, planning, and technical assistance sessions, City of Houston venues for hosting these events, and Harris County, Houston Airport System, and CenterPoint Energy funding for individual planning projects. City of Houston staff is also pursuing a request for a waiver of the match requirement, and will solicit area foundations for contributions to support the match for specific project components (e.g., nonprofit capabilities assessments and continuity of operations planning).

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security provides grants to enhance the capacity of state and local governments to respond to incidents of terrorism and natural disasters through coordinated planning, equipment, training, and exercises. In Texas, the agency that manages and administers these programs is the Governor's Division of Emergency Management (GDEM), which has forwarded the City of Houston's FY08 grant award in a sub-recipient agreement.

FY2008 ALLOCATIONS

Houston's sub-recipient agreement is comprised of several component programs as follows:

- **Urban Area Security Initiative** (\$14,402,160) The UASI program addresses the unique planning, equipment, training and exercise needs of high risk urban areas with funding to develop an enhanced and sustainable capacity to prevent, respond to and recover from threats or acts of terrorism. This FY08 allocation represents a 50% increase in funding for our region (\$37.5 million in FY08, up from \$25 million in FY07 and \$16.67 million in FY06).
 - Local allocations of UASI funds are governed by an executive committee that includes representation from the City of Houston and Harris, Fort Bend and Montgomery counties. The most significant investment of FY2008 funds will include \$8 million for Houston's new radio system.
- State Homeland Security Program (\$765,144.30) SHSP supports the implementation of strategies to address the planning, equipment, training and exercise priorities of state and local governments. The State of Texas allocates these funds by formula to the state's 24 councils of government where local project requests are prioritized. Locally, allocation recommendations are made by H-GAC's Regional Homeland Security Coordinating Council, and approved by the full H-GAC board. Nearly \$3.5 million in FY08 SHSP funding was allocated to H-GAC, down from \$5.9 million in FY07.
- Metropolitan Medical Response System (\$321,221) The MMRS program helps to enhance and sustain integrated, systematic mass casualty incident preparedness, whether natural or human-caused, including chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, explosive, epidemic outbreak or natural disaster. Grant funds are distributed evenly to the 124 eligible jurisdictions in the nation, of which 13 are in Texas.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Council authorize the director of the Mayor's Office of Public Safety & Homeland Security to execute this sub-recipient agreement, and to request and/or accept any amendments/modifications to this agreement or any subsequent agreements necessary to secure Houston's allocations through these grant programs.

Subject: Water Wall

The City of Houston and the Uptown TIRZ have concluded negotiations which have extended well over a year to acquire, for permanent public park use, the square block with the water wall originally known as the Transco Fountain. Completion of this acquisition, financed in part by TIRZ funds and in part by private fundraising, will be a major contribution to our City's future.

This block, originally developed by Houston-based Gerald Hines Interests, has become a Houston landmark, the site of weddings and picnics, and a major tourist destination. It was originally built in 1985, as part of Hines' development of the Galleria complex. Ownership of the block has changed since that time, and on at least one occasion in recent history the block and the fountain was "on the market" for potential development.

Over the last ten years much of the remaining acreage available for new development around the Galleria has been developed, and this block now represents the prime parcel which could be sold for commercial development unless it is secured for use as a park in perpetuity. The pricing terms negotiated by the City and the Uptown Development Authority are very beneficial to the public. A total purchase price of \$8.5 million, which can be accommodated within the TIRZ financial capacity, represents a price per square foot that is below the market value of prime parcels of similar size and location. We will be raising \$2.5 million to reimburse the TIRZ for a portion of the purchase price, further reducing the net cost per square foot of this acquisition. In addition, the owners of the Williams Tower will fund annual operating and general maintenance costs, which were \$150,000 last year. The TIRZ will fund certain expenses for water, electricity and any needed future capital improvements.

The 3-acre tract features a 64 foot high semicircular water wall, with surfaces of black obsidian aggregate material. The exterior support was precast with special concrete. There is a 360 foot lawn, flanked by 11.5 foot sidewalks. The property contains 186 live

oak trees. Columns of limestone with black granite bases provide an additional, distinctive feature for this facility.

We intend to form a non-profit conservancy group that could ensure community oversight of this site for the long-run.

Like many real estate transactions, the City and the Uptown Development Authority had many requirements to ensure public access and preservation of this great site. We bargained hard for a good price. There are significant amounts of documentation to effect this real estate purchase, which will be completed in a short period of time. Ms. Stein can arrange for briefings for various Council Members. I want to commend the owners of the property, with whom I have had some discussions over an extended period of time about the public importance of preserving this space, rather than selling it for development to the highest bidder.

PURCHASE OF WATERWALL TRACT

Summary of Terms of Purchase and Transaction Structure

Terms of Purchase

- Purchase of the approximately 2.8 acre waterwall tract (the "Waterwall") adjacent to the Williams Tower by the Uptown Development Authority ("UDA")
- The Property is currently owned by two entities affiliated with Hines Interests ("Hines")
- Purchase price of \$8.5 million payable in cash at closing
- Earnest money of \$250,000 (not at risk unless contract not terminated during feasibility period)
- Closing on December 31, 2008

Deed

- Deed conveying waterwall tract from Hines to UDA will contain restrictions limiting its use to park purposes and uses ancillary to a park with reverter if property ceases to be used for park purposes or if UDA fails to pay for capital repairs, electricity and water.
 - Hines must pay UDA \$8.5 million as condition to exercising right of reverter.
 - If property reverts to the Williams Tower Owner, the Williams Tower Owner must operate property as a park for 5 years. UDA shall have option to purchase property for \$8.5 million plus accrued operation and maintenance expenses during 5 year option period.
- Deed will provide for the Williams Tower Owner to reserve the right to operate and maintain the park pursuant to a Park Agreement between the owner of the Williams Tower ("Williams Tower Owner") and the UDA.
 - If the Williams Tower Owner terminates the Park Agreement it remains liable for its share of the operation and maintenance costs. If the Williams Tower Owner fails to pay these costs, it loses the right of reverter, the right to appoint a representative of the Committee and the right to approve improvements.
 - If the Park Agreement is terminated, the Williams Tower Owner loses its right to approve Park Rules but reserves right to provide maintenance and easement to provide maintenance.
 - If the Williams Tower Owner fails to pay costs after termination of Park Agreement, the Williams Tower Owner loses right to reverter in all circumstances other than UDA's failure to use property for park purposes.

- Hines reserves an easement, subject to Park Rules, to benefit owner of adjacent office tower and its, tenants, occupants and invitees.
- Deed will prohibit the making of improvements above or below ground except:
 - UDA may place two (2) kiosks not exceeding 100 square feet at locations and pursuant to plans approved by a committee composed of two members, one of whom is appointed by the Williams Tower Owner and one of whom is appointed by UDA (the "Committee").
 - UDA may construct, install and alter landscaping and park related improvements such as landscaped areas, lighting and other improvements related to public safety, irrigation systems, fountains, walkways, fencing and similar improvements which do not materially change the character of the Property.
 - UDA may construct and install other improvements approved by the Committee.
- Deed will require that the UDA operate the Waterwall for at least thirty (30) years in accordance with Park Rules, except:
 - During excused periods resulting from casualty, condemnation, and force majeure.
 - UDA shall have no obligation to repair or replace the Waterwall in the event of casualty or condemnation unless sufficient proceeds are available.

Ancillary Agreements

- The UDA will enter into a contract ("Park Agreement") with the owner of the Williams Tower (the "Williams Tower Owner") which will be responsible for the administration, operation and maintenance of the park.
- The UDA shall promulgate Park Rules based on the Park Rules for Discovery Green which will govern the operation of the park. The Park Rules may be amended by the UDA subject to the approval of the Committee.

Park Agreement

- Initial term of 3 years.
- Will appoint The Williams Tower Owner as Administrator of Park Rules.
- UDA will be responsible for payment of capital repairs, electricity and water.
 - Capital repairs are defined in the Park Agreement.
 - No capital repairs costing more than \$5,000 may be made without the approval of the UDA.

- Williams Tower Owner will pay all other costs of administration, operation and maintenance of the Waterwall.
- Termination by the Williams Tower Owner without cause upon 120 days notice.
 - After termination, the Williams Tower Owner will pay its costs of operation and maintenance (exclusive of costs of capital repairs (as defined in the Park Agreement), electricity and water) based on annual budget proposed by UDA and approved by the Williams Tower Owner.
 - If the Williams Tower Owner and UDA cannot agree on budget, either party may submit the dispute to arbitration.
- No assignment of the Park Agreement without consent of UDA except to a purchaser of the Williams Tower.
- The Williams Tower Owner to indemnify UDA for negligent acts or willful misconduct of Hines its, agents employees and contractors.
- Park Agreement to contain standards which would require maintenance, at a minimum, at the current level.

I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY


City Council created Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number Twenty-One (Hardy/Near Northside Zone – the "Zone") by Ordinance No. 2003-1258 on December 17, 2003 pursuant to a public hearing held on November 19, 2003. The City proposes to modify the preliminary plan by adopting this Final Project Plan & Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan (the "Final Plan"). The Final Plan reflects new project financing priorities that will include the following: 1) affordable housing development; and 2) mobility improvements.

The basis for the creation of the Zone in 2003 was to facilitate the redevelopment of the former 43-acre Union Pacific rail yard site and the general North Main St. area to promote mixed-use and affordable housing development within the overall 242-acre zone. The revitalization of this 242-acre area (gross acres inclusive of ROW and public properties) was initially intended to be led by the transition of the rail yard site into a new inner-city neighborhood ("Hardy Place") characterized by a dynamic mix of uses, high residential densities, a pleasant and walkable street environment and a transit-friendly design. However, the original developer behind the Hardy Place redevelopment concept subsequently sold the property on which it was centered and subsequent owners have not pursued significant redevelopment activity.

The Houston-Galveston Area Council projects that approximately one million new residents will move to the Houston area in the next 10 years, and that the metropolitan area will continue to grow from its current population of 4.8 to 7.5 million by 2025. CDS Market Research estimates that these new residents will require approximately 589,000 new dwelling units and that 62,000 dwelling units are likely to be purchased or rented downtown, provided housing can be made available to meet their needs (see Appendix A, pg. 12).

The Zone, shown as Exhibit 1, is strategically located within an area generally bounded by the north right-of-way line of Interstate 10 on the South, the far western boundary of White Oak Bayou on the west, the north right-of-way lines of Paschall, Gargan, Henry and Brooks Streets in stair-step fashion on the north, the east right-of-way line of Maffitt Street on the east, including the Main Street corridor and properties fronting both sides of N. Main Street to Henry Street.

At the time of the Zone's creation in 2003, the Houston-Galveston Area Council projected that approximately one million new residents would move to the Houston area in the next 10 years, and that the metropolitan area will continue to grow from its current population of 4.8 to 7.5 million by 2025. CDS Market Research estimates that these new residents will require approximately 589,000 new dwelling units and that 62,000 dwelling units are likely to be purchased or rented downtown, provided housing can be made available to meet their needs (see Appendix A, pg. 12).

II. PROJECT PLAN

This document constitutes the Final Plan for the Zone and has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 311.011 of the Texas Tax Code. The Final Plan describes the project costs to be funded by the Zone along with the methods of financing and sources of funding available to the Zone.

A. Existing Conditions and Proposed Uses §311.011(b)(1)

Existing Conditions -

The Zone is located immediately north of downtown Houston. It is an industrial area once dominated by a 100-year-old long discontinued Union Pacific (UP) rail yard recently sold for non-rail use. The rail yard area requires significant environmental remediation beyond that done by UP prior to sale, and that cleanup is critical to the revitalization of the 43-acre catalyst project that is the linchpin to the rejuvenation of the entire area. These remediation costs will be borne by the current owners of the former

Union Pacific rail yard site.

With the purchase of the site, the owners of the 43-acre Hardy Yard joined the Voluntary Cleanup Program (VCP) with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) in order to ultimately obtain a residential environmental closure for the site. Environmental work at the site has been completed to the point that the owners of the site obtained a Conditional Closure Certificate from the TCEQ on April 14, 2008.


This is a very old area of Houston and suffers from declining and limited infrastructure. Because of the existing land uses, the 43-acre rail site has typical road patterns and water and sewer systems of an aging industrial area and most of the area's infrastructure was installed before storm water systems were constructed. Therefore extensive infrastructure improvements, including roads, are needed. The lack of a roadway network has made it difficult to access Near Northside neighborhoods from Downtown. Improving access and circulation in Hardy Yard will improve access to the Near Northside and help residents and property owners grow their community.

Moreover, the necessity to retain a certain number of railroad tracks will require some of the mobility projects to be grade separated. Creating an access corridor is vital to opening the area and allowing circulatory patterns open to the Central Business District (CBD).


The proposed Hardy Toll Road Connector is to extend into the CBD and will be constructed along the eastern boundary of the Zone. Improving east/west, north/south, and freeway access to the site will provide a means of stimulating redevelopment, improving existing conditions, and addressing the mobility needs of the entire Near Northside community.

The area between the rail line and I-10 was developed originally as Houston's warehouse district, serving as the link between the original port at Allen's Landing and the railroad network. As Houston grew, the port moved downstream to the Turning Basin on the Ship Channel, and the area lost importance as a warehouse center. However, oilfield service companies and other industrial users remain in the area and constitute a significant percentage of the current land mix. The photos below reflect the current conditions in the area.




Much of the west and southwest portions of the Zone are located in the floodway and floodplain and are privately owned.

The proximity of incompatible land uses is shown in the land use map identified as Exhibit 3. This map reflects the current land use mix in the Zone boundaries, as contained in Harris County Appraisal District records in 2002.

Proposed Uses - Through creation of the Zone, the City has an opportunity to influence the delivery of affordable housing in the Zone and the Near Northside generally. Additionally, the Zone may capitalize on recent development trends that will promote transit-oriented, mixed-use development. For example, some of the warehouse structures located in the general area have been converted to artists' studios and loft apartments. The presence of the University of Houston's Downtown campus at One Main could serve as a catalyst for turning this area into a busy student district. The resurgence in new housing in the inner city or close to Downtown demonstrates that a significant residential market component is attracted to living closer to the workplace and the social and

entertainment activities offered Downtown.




Existing land use in Zone

Further underscoring this point, CDS has estimated that within 20 years the region will grow by 1.5 million. This influx of new residents will generate a need for additional dwelling units. Following a recent survey, CDS estimated that potentially 62,000 households are "very likely" to purchase or rent in the Houston CBD or near downtown if housing stock is available.

The Zone will create a mechanism to implement a redevelopment strategy by encouraging strategic partnerships and providing practical implementation tools. This approach capitalizes on the opportunities afforded by the resurgence of development in Downtown Houston, along with the revitalization of the Near Northside. The Zone can stimulate and manage these opportunities to their full potential to create an economically dynamic area anchored by a revitalized, stable, mixed-use community. Exhibit 4 details a potential build-out scenario for the Zone.

B. Municipal Ordinances §311.011(b)(2)

There are no proposed changes to any building codes or other municipal ordinances of the city as a result of the projects proposed herein.

C. Non-Project Costs §311.011(b)(3)

Non-Project Costs represent costs and expenditures for projected private and public investments that will not be funded by the Zone. Exhibit 5 shows the non-Project Costs contemplated.

D. Relocation §311.011(b)(4)

It is not contemplated that either residential or commercial relocation will be required.

III. FINANCING PLAN

In addition to the proposed projects (Non-Project Costs) listed in Exhibit 5, the Zone is intended to provide funding for affordable housing development and municipal services costs associated with increased development projected for the Zone. Successful implementation of the Final Plan should result in an increase in the tax base of the Zone and for the surrounding areas.

A. Estimated Project Costs Description §311.011(c)(1)

It is estimated that the total project costs for the entire 242 acres will be approximately \$24.9 million defined in Exhibit 6.

The Project Costs in Exhibit 6 track the categories of eligible project costs established in Section 311.02 of the Texas Tax Code. The dollar amounts are approximate and may be amended subject to the Zone Board and City Council approval. The financing costs are a function of project financing needs and market conditions and may vary significantly from what is shown. Zone operation costs include both city and Zone administration costs.



B. Kind, Number, and Location of Public Works or Improvements §311.011(c)(2)

Chapter 311 of the Texas Tax Code allows a municipality to expend affordable housing project costs either inside or outside a zone's boundaries. One-third of the revenue net of city and Zone administrative costs will de designated for affordable housing.

The extension of San Jacinto north to the southern terminus of Fulton is depicted in Exhibit 7. This will provide a much needed additional link between Downtown and the Near Northside. This project was identified as a high priority project by the *Northside Village Economic Revitalization Plan* conducted by the city's Planning Department with community input in 2001. Partnerships for the design and construction of this new roadway will be pursued.

C. Economic Feasibility Study §311.011(c)(3)

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 311.011(c)(3), the market research firm CDS Market Research was retained to perform an economic feasibility study (the "Study"). The Study suggests that a strong demand for housing in and near Downtown will prevail during the 30-year life of the Zone based on projected population growth for Harris County and the 1999 CDS Survey of Housing Demand. The Study notes the dwindling supply of large acreage sites suitable in location and price range for redevelopment, which should position the Zone to fill a portion of the growing demand for near town housing.

As previously stated, CDS Market Research estimates that these new residents will require approximately 589,000 new dwelling units and that 62,000 are likely to be purchased or rented downtown, provided housing can be made available to meet their needs (see Appendix A, pg. 12). With regard to the commercial and office development plans projected for the Zone, the Study indicates that these uses comprise only a small fraction of the total demand projected for Harris County during the life of the Zone indicating a likely positive absorption rate within the Zone for these uses. The Zone's projected shares of the total 30-year Harris County demand are 0.7% Residential Housing, 1.2% General Purpose office, 0.6% Multi-Tenant Retail, and 2.6% Office / Service space.

CDS summarizes "that there appears to be sizable market potentials in multiple land uses available to many present and future TIRZs and other real estate developments throughout the Houston area. The Hardy/Near Northside TIRZ offers Houston's extended downtown area and Near Northside the opportunity to participate along with these projects in the substantial market represented by these potentials." A copy of the Study is included as Appendix A.

D. Estimated Bonded Indebtedness to be Incurred §311.011(c)(4)

With City Council approval, the Zone may issue bonds, notes, or other obligations secured by tax increment revenues, at the time the Zone generates sufficient tax increment revenues to pay principal and interest on such obligations, the proceeds of which could be used to pay for project costs as defined in Texas Tax Code Sec. 311.002(1) ("project Costs"). However, the Zone may elect to pay for Project Costs directly from tax increment proceeds as they become available, without the sale of bonds or notes.

E. Estimated Date When Monetary Obligations Are to be Incurred §311.011(c)(5)

The Zone will incur monetary obligations as the stream of tax increment revenues allow. Administrative costs and costs related to the creation and organization of the Zone may be paid from the issuance of bonds or notes or directly from tax increment revenue.

F. Methods of Financing and Sources of Revenue §311.011(c)(6)

To ensure timely construction of public improvements, both "pay-as-you-go" and various methods of financing may be utilized. These include:

Tax Increment Bonds or Notes. As allowed by annual incremental increases in Zone assessed value, tax-exempt tax increment bonds or notes may be issued to fund improvements.

Other private financing. Some projects may be financed on a short-term basis through private financial institutions.

The primary source of revenue will be the tax increment, which is ad valorem real property tax revenue generated on the captured appraised value. The City will participate in the Zone at the city's current tax rate (\$0.63875 per \$100 of assessed value). Should other jurisdictions wish to participate, this Final Plan will allow such participation now or at a later date. In accordance with the provisions of Texas Tax Code Chapter 311, if a jurisdiction chooses to participate in the Zone, its participation will be evidenced by an Interlocal Agreement with the City and the Zone stating the share of property taxes that

will be deposited in the tax increment fund on an annual basis. The current participation levels are shown in Exhibit 8, with tax rates given per \$100 of assessed value:

G. Current Appraised Value of Taxable Real Property §311.011(c)(7)

The total assessed taxable value of real property within the Zone in 2003 (Base Year Value) is \$40,313,080 based upon the 2003 Harris County Certified Tax Roll. The ad valorem tax revenue generated on the Base Year Value will be paid to the participating jurisdictions over the life of the Zone. The Tax Year 2008 taxable value of real property within the Zone is \$86,190,810.

H. Estimated Captured Appraised Value of the Zone During Each Year of Its Existence §311.011(c)(8)

The Zone Project Costs will be funded through capture of incremental ad valorem tax revenue above the Base Year Value, or the "Captured Appraised Value." Exhibit 9 reflects the projected annual Captured Appraised Value and the incremental revenue generated by each jurisdiction's participation.

I. Duration of the Zone §311.011(c)(9)

The Zone has a duration of thirty (30) years and expires of December 31, 2033. However, in the event the Zone improvements are completed and fully repaid, the Zone may be terminated sooner.





The City Purchasing Agent recommends that City Council approve an amending ordinance to increase the spending authority for the contract between the City of Houston and DC Services, LLC from \$3,643,625.00 to \$4,554,531.25 for communication technician services for the Information Technology Department (ITD). This contract was awarded on October 26, 2005, by Ordinance No. 2005-1184 for a three-year term, with two one-year options, for a total five-year term in the amount of \$3,643,625.00. Expenditures as of December 9, 2008 totaled \$2,909,338.00.

The scope of work requires the contractor to provide all technical expertise, supervision, labor, tools, testing equipment, specialized equipment and incidental parts and materials for the repair, installation and/or replacement of cabling, voice and data communications equipment. The additional spending authority is required to provide sufficient funds through the remaining term of the contract. ITD is in the process of completing the third and final phase of the Network Implementation Project (NIP). During the implementation of NIP it was discovered that multiple City facilities did not meet the cabling standards required to upgrade the network infrastructure. This has generated the increase in cabling services.

This contract was awarded with a 24% M/WBE participation goal and DC Services, LLC is currently not achieving the goal. The original M/WBE subcontractor withdrew from the contract because they were unable to perform at the contracted rates. However, DC Services, LLC has been actively working with the Affirmative Action Division (AAD) towards meeting their good faith effort on this contract and have recently added two additional vendors to increase the participation level.

The competitive low rate structure of this contract has limited the opportunity for M/WBE subcontracting. Additionally, ITD and AAD will re-evaluate the M/WBE goal the next time this contract is placed out for bid.

The City Purchasing Agent recommends that City Council approve an ordinance appropriating the sum of \$4,677,423.00 out of the Equipment Acquisition Consolidated Fund (Fund 1800) and approve a three year contract, with two one-year options to Dyonyx, L.P. in the maximum contract amount of \$4,568,421.00 for professional services and related hardware and software to implement Windows Server 2003, or 2008 at the Director's discretion, Active Directory and Exchange Server 2007 for the City's computer network. The requested appropriation will provide initial contract funding in the amount of \$3,595,256.00, plus \$1,082,167.00 for salary recovery and support costs. The remaining contract funding (\$973,165.00) and additional salary recovery and support costs (\$1,192,833.00) will be appropriated by future Council action. The total program cost for this implementation of the active directory framework and the City's new email systems will be \$6,843,421.00.

The scope of work requires the contractor to provide all labor, equipment, supplies, supervision, training and all ancillary services necessary to implement Windows Server 2003, or 2008 at the Director's discretion, Active Directory and Exchange Server 2007 on the City's computer network. Additionally, the contract has a special services option for the management, storage and archival of electronic documents, which the City can exercise.

Background

The purpose of this contract is to (1) implement Enterprise Microsoft Active Directory, (2) upgrade the outdated citywide Microsoft Exchange (email) system, and (3) upgrade the existing Microsoft Office desktop software. The current Exchange system (Microsoft Exchange 5.5) is no longer supported by Microsoft.

The benefits of the Enterprise Microsoft Active Directory infrastructure include:

- An enterprise-scale authentication and authorization mechanism for ensuring that City employees have single sign-on access to the resources they need.
- A foundation for employee self-help websites that can be used to distribute information in real-time.
- Ability to better manage personnel information (phone, e-mail), computer resources, and printers.
- Capability to provide a common directory schema that can be leveraged by department Web
 applications to ensure that the most accurate and relevant information is provided to end-users.
- Ability to simplify management tasks, strengthen network security and make use of existing systems through interoperability.
- Capability to consolidate resources (human and machine) and improve organizational scalability employees can move beyond repetitive tasks and specialize.
- Opportunity to reduce overall technology support costs.

<u>Implementation</u>

The Active Directory and Exchange implementation includes an Assessment, Design, Planning, Testing, Implementation, Training and Support phase. The scope of work includes building the new Active Directory data structure and migrating all 14,000 users from the legacy platform to the new AD/EX infrastructure. The scope of work also includes migrating 4,000 HPD users from their current Novell GroupWise and Netware environment to the new Microsoft based infrastructure. This will provide significant improvement for securing and efficiently sharing information, data, calendaring, etc. across all 23 departments. A Governance Committee made up of the department Chief Technology Officers, chaired by the Chief Technology Officer, will be used to vet the final architecture design and implementation plan. Designated IT professionals from each department will also be involved to ensure unique departmental requirements are assessed and addressed in the final design, implementation and training phases.

A Request for Proposal (RFP) was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the State bid laws and, as a result, proposals were received from ten firms: Perficient, Dyonyx, L.P., IBM, Hewlett-Packard, Idea Integration, Unisys, GTSI, Dell, MTI Technology Corporation and SHI Government Solutions. Evaluation of the proposals was performed by technical and operations personnel from the Information Technology, Police, Public Works and Engineering, Municipal Courts Administration, Library, Fire Departments and the Houston Airport System based upon the following criteria:

- A. Contractor Competence
- B. Conformance to Requirements of the Scope of Work
- C. Pricing
- D. M/WBE Capacity

Dyonyx, L.P. received the highest overall score.

M/WBE Subcontracting

The contract requires that the contractor make a good faith effort to award M/WBE subcontracts or supply agreements in at least 35% of the value of services and 10% of the value of hardware/software procured under this agreement.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Houston Parks and Recreation Department, along with Trees for Houston, Texas Department of Transportation, Houston's Quality of Life Coalition, the Greater Houston Partnership and numerous corporations and green advocacy organizations have joined in an effort known as "Million Trees + Houston" in the next four to five years. This campaign seeks to plant 1,000,000 new trees. The initiative will add valuable forest canopy that will clean our air, reduce pollutants and cool us during the Houston summer. Our corporate partners in this venture recognize that a greener city will help attract business and residents and encourage neighborhood revitalization, both key to Houston's continued economic vitality. A website has been established for more information – www.milliontreesplushouston.org.

The City of Houston has taken a leadership role in this endeavor. Council approved funds for tree planting in the FY2009 Parks and Recreation Department budget in the amount of \$750,000. The administration now requests approval of an ordinance awarding a three-year contract with two one-year options to LandPRO, Inc. on its low complete bid in an amount not to exceed \$1,295,296.70 for tree planting and maintenance services. The balance of contract funding will be provided by private donations and sponsorships with public agencies, which will be deposited into the newly created Parks Planting Trees Fund.

This project was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the State of Texas bid laws. Twenty-five prospective bidders downloaded the solicitation document from SPD's e-bidding website and six bids were received as outlined below.



WARD: The low bidder, SER Construction Partners, Ltd., failed to comply with requirements stated in the bid documents that ne bidder submit documentation of prior successful experience in this type of waterline project. These requirements were made part of the project documents due to the complexity and magnitude of the project, and also the critical nature of the referenced project to meet the specific project schedules. Potential delays in meeting the project schedule due to work involving the tank connections, SBPS discharge line, and 16-inch water line along Westheimer will pose a hardship on the City and its water customers. These setbacks may also cause delays for other projects throughout the City. The Assistant City Attorney has rendered a legal opinion that SER Construction Partners, Ltd. is a "non-responsible" bidder. Therefore, it is recommended that this construction contract be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, Texas Sterling Construction Co., with a bid of \$8,920,488.00, and that Addendum Number 1 be made a part of this contract.

By your memorandum dated August 7, 2008, you have asked the Bid Irregularity Committee whether you may bypass award of a construction contract for large diameter potable water line interconnections and facility connections at the Sims Bayou Pump Station (Solicitation No. S30-L22511) (the "Project") to low bidder SER Construction Partners, Ltd. ("SER") because SER does not meet minimal experience qualifications for the Project. After the Committee's meeting on September 23, 2008, you provided the Legal Department with additional evidence to support your position.

The City must accept SER's low bid unless it is a "nonresponsible" bidder. While the bid laws do not define "nonresponsible", case law and Attorney General Opinions identify factors the City can use to determine responsibility. Contracting authorities have wide discretion to reject a bid, as long as the decision is not arbitrary or unreasonable and as long as they have "an objective reason, supported by facts fairly known to them, that a particular bidder cannot perform responsibly because of some objective impediment." Op. Tex. Att'y Gen. No. JM-881 (1988). This objective impediment may relate to a bidder's experience, equipment, number of employees, or need for supervision. Corbin v. Collin County Commissioners' Court, 651 S.W.2d 55, 56 (Tex. App.--Dallas 1983, no writ). The City may also consider factors such as a bidder's "financial resources, business judgment, ability, efficiency, reliability, reputation, facilities, and capacity to perform the work required", provided that such factors have a "definite and objective relationship to matters of quality and competence." Op. Tex. Att'y Gen. No. DM-113 (1992).

In your Summary of Two Low Bidder Qualifications attached to your memorandum, you mention several factors that, in your opinion, indicate SER does not meet minimal experience requirements for the Project. In particular, you mention that SER has not constructed a potable water line of sufficient diameter and is behind schedule on several current projects.

Section 4.0, paragraph G.c. of Document 00495 (Post Bid Procedures) requires the low bidder to "demonstrate the following: Completion of at least one (1) water line project that was at least 48-inches in diameter or greater within the past five (5) years." SER did not provide you evidence that it ever worked on or completed at least one such water line project. But SER did acquire Ramos Industries, Inc. in 2007, and Ramos completed a 60-inch raw water line for the City of Corpus Christi. Two factors affect SER's responsibility with regard to the Sims Bayou Project. First, Ramos finished the Corpus Christi project significantly behind schedule. Second, the 60-inch line Ramos completed was a raw – not potable – water line. Raw water is water taken from the environment and then treated to produce potable water. In your opinion, construction of a potable water line requires a contractor to have expertise beyond that needed to construct a raw water line.

Section 4.0, Paragraph G.a of the Post Bid Procedures requires the low bidder to demonstrate a "(r)ecord of completing projects on schedule." SER has nine projects currently under construction. As of July 25, 2008, SER was behind schedule on seven of these nine projects, including two for the City of Houston.

You stress in your memorandum that the Project is of critical importance to the City. The Sims Bayou Pump Station will play a significant role in meeting the drinking water needs of citizens while the 66-inch line along Richmond Avenue is out of service for condition assessment in connection with the construction of a light rail line along Richmond Avenue by the Metropolitan Transit Authority of Harris County, Texas ("METRO"). METRO intends to begin construction of the line soon and time is of the essence in this Project.


The facts as you have presented them support a finding that SER is a nonresponsible bidder. If SER qualified as the low bidder and entered into a contract with the City, it would be reasonable for the City to believe that SER's inexperience with large-diameter potable water line projects and its history of falling behind schedule are objective impediments making it likely that it could not perform the contract satisfactorily. Section 15-46(b) of the City Code of Ordinances delegates to the Director of the Department of Public Works and Engineering the authority to reject any or all bids pursuant to section 252.043 of the Texas Local Government Code and recommend award of the contract to the next low bidder that is also a responsible bidder.



Article XI Chapter 47, of the City of Houston Ordinance, controls generation, management and disposal of liquid waste within the city limits. This action protects the health and safety of citizens and employees of waste water treatment facilities; it protects the environment from potential danger of mismanagement of such wastes; and ultimately it protects the infrastructure of the Publicly Owned Treatment Works, including the collection system. Currently, the Code of Ordinances classifies liquid waste into three categories. Class A waste is domestic septic tank waste, generated by single family residences. Class B is grease trap waste ("FOG"), sewage sludge and portable toilet waste. Class C waste comes from lint traps and grit traps, and includes wastes from industrial processes. Currently, the Code allows a transporter of Class A waste to use either a septic tank control ticket or a solid waste manifest. A solid waste manifest is used for hauling Class B and C waste. Transporters appear to be confused about which document is appropriate. Further, because the current system requires transporters to use separate designated vehicles for each type of waste, this is an additional cost to transporters. In conjunction with streamlining the waste manifest, staff recommends eliminating the three waste classifications. Instead, all liquid waste will be handled as "city regulated waste," which should enable transporters to use one vehicle for all types of waste and maximize their capital investment. This will also yield versatility of route designations for transporters. The Houston Department of Health and Human Services (HDHHS) requests City Council to approve amendments to Article XI of Chapter 47 of the Code of Ordinances. These amendments are consistent and in conformation with TCEQ's Manifest standard and support the City's efforts to streamline the transportation and treatment of certain waste. Thus, reducing fuel cost and air pollution.

ARTICLE XI. TRANSPORTATION AND TREATMENT OF CERTAIN WASTES

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 47-411. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Biological pretreatment service means the application of any additive or enzyme, including approved bioremediation media, or the use of any other biological means to digest waste in a grit trap/lint trap or grease trap that discharges into a public sewer system within the city.

Biological pretreatment service permit means a current and valid permit issued pursuant to this article authorizing the performance of biological pretreatment service.

Bioremediation media means enzymes or microbes injected into an interceptor for the purpose of biodegrading fat, oil, and grease. This term does not include any additives that will saponify or emulsify fat, oil and grease.

City official means the director of the department of health and human services or the director of the department of public works and engineering or their designees.

Class A site operator means a person having ownership or control of a site where Class A waste is generated.

<u>City-regulated waste means liquid, semi-liquid and solid wastes</u> and wastewater removed from septic tanks used by single-family or multiple residential units, institutions or commercial establishments that primarily generate waste of a type associated with domestic use. It includes oily water, FOG, grease trap waste, sewage sludge, and portable toilet waste; as well as any materials collected in a septic tank, grit trap, lint trap, retention pond, utility service vault or any similar device, which materials result from or are incidental to any process of industrial, manufacturing, institutional or commercial operations including, but not limited to, mobile or stationary car or truck washing, pavement washing, environmental testing facilities and commercial laundries or laundromats.

Class A waste means wastes and wastewater removed from domestic septic tanks used by single or multiple residential units, schools, hotels/motels, restaurants, and similar establishments that primarily generate waste of a type associated with domestic/residential uses. Class A waste does not include waste removed from a septic tank that receives non-domestic types of commercial

wastewater or receives industrial wastewater, nor does the term include grease removed from a grease trap or grit trap/lint trap waste.

Class C waste means any materials collected in a septic tank, grit trap, lint trap, retention pond, utility service vault or any similar device, which materials result from or are incidental to any process of industrial, manufacturing, institutional or commercial operations including, but not limited to, mobile or stationary car or truck washing, pavement washing, environmental testing facilities and commercial laundries or laundromats. However, this term shall not include domestic septic tank waste.

Container means any portable device in which material is stored, transported, processed, disposed of or otherwise handled.

Department or HDHHS means the department of health and human services.

Discharge or indirect discharge means the introduction of pollutants into the sanitary sewer system.

Disposal means the act of disposing.

Disposal site means a state-permitted or state-registered fixed facility to which waste is delivered for disposal.

Dispose means deposit, release, inject, dump, spill, leak or place any waste (whether or not contained) into or on any land or water so that the waste or any constituent thereof may enter the environment, including disposal into the air or discharge into any waters, including groundwater or sanitary or storm sewer systems.

Disposer means a person who operates a disposal site.

Drying bed means a structure intended for the drying of grit trap waste.

EPA means the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

Fats, oils and greases (FOG) means petroleum-based or mineral-based oils and greases or animal and vegetable-based fats. All are sometimes referred to herein as "grease" or "greases." These substances are detectable and measurable using analytical procedures established in 40 CFR 136, as may be amended from time to time.

Food service establishment has the meaning ascribed in section 20-18 of this Code, but shall not include mobile food units.

Generator means any person whose activities or processes generate <u>city-regulated Class B or C-</u>waste within the city or who stores <u>city-regulated Class B or C-</u>waste within the city.

Generator permit means a current and valid permit issued pursuant to this article.

Generator permit number means the unique identification number on the generator permit.

Generator registration certificate means a current and valid certificate issued to a food service establishment pursuant to division 2 of this article.

Grease trap waste means that material accumulated in an interceptor in the sewer system at a food service establishment or any operation requiring a food dealer's permit pursuant to section 20-36 of this Code.

Grit trap/lint trap waste means waste collected in an interceptor at any maintenance and repair shop, automobile service station, car wash, laundry, beauty salon or other similar establishment.

Incompatible wastes means wastes that have different processing, storage or disposal requirements, or wastes that if mixed may cause a dangerous chemical or physical reaction.

Interceptor means a device designed to use differences in specific gravities to separate and retain FOG and settleable solids prior to the wastewater entering the sanitary sewer system. Interceptors may also be referred to as "grease traps."-

Interference means a discharge that alone or in conjunction with a discharge or discharges from other sources inhibits or disrupts the sanitary sewer system, its treatment processes or operations or its sludge processes, use or disposal, or is a cause of a violation of any city TPDES permit, as defined in Article XII.

Manifest means a form approved by the health officer to document the collection, <u>transportation</u>transfer, and disposal of <u>city-regulated</u> <u>Class B or C</u> waste.

Permit year means a permit period which runs from the 1st of February through the 31st of January of the following year.

Registered vehicle means a vehicle that is in compliance with all the requirements of division 4 of this article.

Sample well means a physical connection on a generator's sewer that is constructed to allow access for sampling and inspection of its interceptor.

Sanitary sewer system means the city's devices and systems used in the storage, recycling, and reclamation of municipal sewage or industrial wastes of a liquid or semi-liquid nature, including all sewers, pipes and other conveyances that convey wastewater to a sewage treatment plant. For purposes of this article, the terms public sewer system, "sewer system" and "POTW" as defined in Article XII, may be construed to have the same meaning as "sanitary sewer system."

Septic tank control ticket means a form issued by the health officer to document the collection, transfer and disposal of Class A waste.

Sewage sludge means the residual material generated from the treatment of wastewater by a sewage treatment plant or pretreatment plant or material resulting from the cleaning of sanitary sewer lines.

Site means a contiguous tract or parcel of land under common ownership.

Spill means the loss or unauthorized release of waste.

Temporary transporter permit means a one month permit issued pursuant to division 3 of this article.

Transporter (primary or secondary) means a person who accepts waste that originates from a location within the city and who uses public rights-of-way for transportation of the waste. A generator or disposer who transfers its own waste over city streets for off-site disposal is also a transporter.

Transporter's manager means the individual having the primary responsibility for compliance with this article as identified on the transporter permit application form.

Transporter permit means a permit other than a temporary transporter permit issued pursuant to division 3 of this article.

Vehicle registration certificate means a certificate issued pursuant to division 4 of this article.

Waste means <u>any type of Class A waste, Class B waste, Class C city-regulated</u> waste or any mixture <u>there</u>of those wastes.

Waste load means the volume of waste that is transported from any specific site.

Sec. 47-412. Scope; interceptor requirement.

The purpose of this article is to protect the citizens and the environment from the potential hazard that may result from unauthorized waste releases and to deter illegal introduction of pollutants into the sanitary sewer system, storm sewers, street rights-of-way and other unauthorized places. It is not the intent of this article to address transportation of hazardous material in commerce or to regulate hazardous wastes that are subject to federal manifest requirements.

Sec. 47-413. Defenses.

- (a) It is a defense to prosecution under this article that:
- (1) The act or action complained of was the subject of regulation by the United States Secretary of Transportation under Chapter 51 of Title 49 of the United States Code; or
- (2) The act or action complained of related to the generation, transportation, or disposal of waste that was subject to federal manifest requirements.
- (b) With respect to sewage sludge, it is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this article that the sewage sludge meets the requirements of state regulations for land application for beneficial use.

Sec. 47-414. Mixing of wastes prohibited.

- (a) No person shall mix incompatible wastes in the same container. It is a defense to prosecution under this section that a transporter mixed wastes as authorized in section 47-544 of this Code.
- (b) No <u>city-regulated Class B waste or Class C</u> waste may be directly disposed into the sanitary sewer.

Sec. 47-415. Penalty.

Except as may otherwise be provided, whenever in this article an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or misdemeanor, or whenever in this article the doing of any thing or act is required or the failure to do any thing or act is prohibited, the violation of the provision shall be and constitute a

misdemeanor punishable, upon conviction, by a fine of not less than \$250.00 nor more than \$2,000.00. Each day that any violation continues shall constitute and be punishable as a separate offense. Any offense under this article that also constitutes a violation of any state penal law shall be punishable as provided in the applicable state law.

Sec. 47-416. Enforcement; legal actions.

- (a) Any or all of the following remedies may be employed by the city to abate and prevent further violations of the provisions of this article:
 - (1) The department may discontinue city water service.
 - (2) The department may disconnect and seal the sanitary sewer connection.
- (b) The city official is authorized to issue citations charging the violation of any of the provisions of this article.
- (c) Consistent with applicable provisions of state and federal laws and regulations, the city attorney is hereby authorized to file and maintain civil legal actions to:
 - (1) Enjoin any violations of this article; and
 - (2) Enforce the state solid waste and water quality laws relating to matters addressed by this article.

Sec. 47-417. Responsibilities of agents and employees.

The responsibilities created under this article for Class A site operators, biological pretreatment service providers, disposers, generators and transporters shall extend to the owners and other persons having possession and control of the site, facilities or equipment as well as to their officers, agents and employees having responsibilities for their operations.

Sec. 47-418. Hearings.

Applicants for permits or registrations under this article who are denied original or renewal permits or registrations or who are subject to revocation or suspension proceedings shall be afforded a right to a hearing. The hearings shall be conducted by a person designated by the director of the department in accordance with regulations issued for that purpose by the director. The regulations shall be submitted to the city attorney for approval prior to promulgation. If any of the grounds relate to section 1-10 of this Code, then a hearing shall be conducted under section 1-9 of this Code regarding those grounds.

Sec. 47-419. Regulations.

The health officer is authorized to promulgate such regulations as are necessary to implement the provisions of this article. a copy of the regulations shall be maintained in the HDHHS offices for inspection by the public, and copies shall be made available for purchase at the fees prescribed by law.

Sec. 47-420. Reserved.

DIVISION 2. PERMITTING AND REGISTRATION OF GENERATORS

Sec. 47-421. Permit or registration required.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person, other than one operating a food service establishment, to act as a generator at any site for which a current and valid generator permit has not been issued under this division.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person operating a food service establishment to act as a generator at any site for which a current and valid generator registration certificate has not been issued under this division.
- (c) It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this section that the waste generated at the site contains no Class B or C city-regulated waste.

Sec. 47-422. Application.

In order to obtain a generator permit, a person shall complete a form provided by the health officer and pay the applicable fee. The applicant shall certify the holding capacity of the interceptor and provide evidence of any waste permits issued by the state to the applicant. If a site has more than one interceptor, a separate application must be completed for each interceptor.

Sec. 47-423. Fees; issuance of permit or registration certificate.

- (a) The applicant shall submit a nonrefundable annual fee of \$50.00 for each interceptor with each original and renewal application for a generator permit or registration certificate. The fee shall be payable in the form prescribed in the application. There shall be no fee to amend a generator permit or registration certificate; provided, however, that a fee of \$25.00 shall be required to reissue a lost generator permit or registration certificate.
- (b) The health officer shall either issue or deny the generator permit or registration certificate within 30 days after receipt of a completed application. If the generator permit or registration certificate is denied, the health officer shall provide written notice of the reasons to applicant, and the applicant shall be afforded

opportunity to respond. The health officer shall issue the generator permit or registration certificate unless:

- (1) The applicant provided incomplete or inaccurate information; or
- (2) The applicant did not file an affidavit certifying the holding capacity of the interceptor; or
- (3) The applicant did not pay any required fee.
- (c) The health officer shall, from time to time, prepare and submit for approval by motion of the city council a schedule of fees that shall be paid by an applicant for a permit or a registration certificate. Payment of any applicable fees when due is a condition of the processing of any application under this article.
- (d) All fees collected pursuant to this division shall be deposited in the special waste transportation and inspection fund account established by the city council. Funds from this account may be expended only for the costs of permitting, inspecting, monitoring, controlling, educating and enforcing any violation pertaining to the management and disposal of Class A, B, or C city-regulated waste.

Sec. 47-424. Term; revocation.

- (a) Subject to continuing compliance with applicable provisions of this article, a generator permit or registration certificate shall be valid for a period of 12 months from the date it is issued.
- (b) Following notice of the grounds and an opportunity for a hearing, the health officer may revoke a generator permit or registration certificate.

Sec. 47-425. Amendment.

A holder of a generator permit or registration certificate shall have a continuing duty to apply for an amended permit or registration certificate within 15 days after the occurrence of an event that causes a change in any information for which a representation was made in its application. Failure to timely submit an application for an amendment shall cause the generator permit or registration certificate to become void. Applications for amendments shall be processed, and amended permits and registration certificates shall be issued, subject to the same criteria as original applications, no later than 15 days following the occurrence of the event making the amendment necessary.

Sec. 47-426. Assignment or transfer prohibited.

A generator permit or registration certificate is personal to the holder to whom it is issued and is valid only for the site and interceptor specified on the permit or certificate. A generator permit or registration certificate may not be conveyed or assigned to another person.

Sec. 47-427. Posting required; fee for lost permit or certificate.

Each generator shall cause its generator permit or registration certificate to be conspicuously posted at the site for which it is issued. Upon request of a transporter or the health officer, the generator shall specify the location at which the generator permit or registration certificate is posted and shall make the generator permit or registration certificate available for inspection. If upon inspection the health officer cannot readily determine that the generator permit or registration certificate is available for inspection, the permit or certificate will be deemed lost. A fee of \$25.00 shall be imposed for reissuing a lost generator permit or registration certificate as provided in section 47-423 of this Code.

Secs. 47-428--47-430. Reserved.

DIVISION 3. PERMITTING OF TRANSPORTERS

Sec. 47-431. Permit required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to act as a transporter unless the person holds a current and valid transporter permit or temporary transporter permit or is acting as the agent or employee of a person who holds a current and valid transporter permit or temporary transporter permit.

Sec. 47-432. Types of waste covered.

Each transporter permit or temporary transporter permit shall specify the type or types of waste for which it is applicable. A transporter permit or temporary transporter permit is valid only for the classification or classifications of waste specified thereon.

Sec. 47-433. Application.

The health officer shall promulgate forms for original and renewal transporter permit or temporary transporter permit applications, which shall request the following information:

(1) Name, street address, mailing address and telephone number of the applicant. The "applicant" shall be deemed to include the proprietorship, each partner if a partnership and each officer, director or holder of ten percent or more of the outstanding shares if a corporation.

- (2) Name, street address and mailing address of the applicant's manager.
- (3) A photocopy of the driver's license of each person, including the applicant's transporter manager, who will be authorized to operate any of the applicant's vehicles for the transportation of wastes under the permit.
- (4) The nature and classification of any waste that originates within the city that the applicant intends to transport.
- (5) For each motor vehicle and motor vehicle trailer that the applicant desires to register under division 4 of this article, the following information:
 - a. The make, model and year of manufacture.
 - b. The current state vehicle license plate number.
 - c. The vehicle identification number.
 - d. The vehicle's waste hauling capacity certification.
 - e. A photocopy of the vehicle's registration papers.
- (6) Whether the applicant or the applicant's manager or any vehicle driver has been convicted of any violation for which a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit is subject to denial, refusal to renew, or revocation under section 1-10 of this Code.
- (7) The address of the physical location where each vehicle will be parked or garaged when not in use, if different from the addresses identified in items (1) and (2).
- (8) Evidence of financial responsibility for each vehicle and trailer in amounts of not less than the minimum required by the state financial responsibility law. If the proof of financial responsibility is in the form of an insurance policy, then the insurance policy must contain an endorsement requiring 30 days' advance written notice of cancellation to the health officer.
- (9) Texas Commission on Environmental Quality transportation registration number.

Sec. 47-434. Fee.

A nonrefundable permit application review fee of \$90.00 shall be submitted with each original and renewal application for a transporter permit. A nonrefundable permit application fee of \$30.00 shall be submitted with each original and renewal application for a temporary transporter permit. The fee shall be payable in such form as specified

by the health officer on the application. There shall be no application review fee payable for the filing of an application for an amendment.

Sec. 47-435, Review.

- (a) Unless a hearing is required under section 1-9 of this Code, the health officer shall either grant or deny the permit within five days following the receipt of a completed application for a temporary transporter permit or within 30 days following the receipt of a completed application for a transporter permit. If the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit is denied, written notice of the reasons shall be provided to applicant, and the applicant shall be afforded an opportunity for a hearing. The health officer shall grant the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit unless one or more of the following applies:
 - (1) The applicant provided incomplete or inaccurate information in the application.
 - (2) The applicant did not file any required bond or pay any required fee.
 - (3) A transporter permit or temporary transporter permit held by the applicant is currently under suspension.
 - (4) A transporter permit or temporary transporter permit held by the applicant has been revoked or refused for renewal for cause within one calendar year of the date of filing of an application form.
 - (5) The applicant failed to submit any required information or documents regarding any vehicle to be registered under the permit.
 - (6) The applicant failed to submit proof that it holds any required state registration, license or permit for the services to be provided.
- (b) If it appears that the applicant, the applicant's manager, or any vehicle driver has been convicted of any violation for which a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit is subject to denial, refusal to renew, or revocation under section 1-10 of this Code, then the permit application may also be denied on that grounds, provided that the applicant shall be given notice and an opportunity for a hearing under section 1-9 of this Code.

Sec. 47-436. Permit bond.

The applicant shall submit a City of Houston waste transportation permit bond to the department prior to the being issued a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit. The amount of the bond required shall be determined by the highest waste classification of the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit:

	occurrence

For a transporter permit, the aggregate penal amount of the bond shall not be less than \$150,000 five times the applicable per occurrence amount specified above. For a temporary transporter permit, the aggregate penal amount of the bond shall not be less \$30,000 than one times the applicable per occurrence amount, as specified above. The bond shall be issued by the applicant as principal and a corporate surety authorized to transact business in Texas as surety upon the penal condition that the principal and surety will reimburse the city for the cleanup costs of any spill that may arise as a result of operations conducted under the permit within 30 days following demand. The bond shall expressly waive any requirement of notice to the principal or surety prior to the commencement of cleanup operations or the incurring of costs therefor. The bond shall be in a form approved by the city attorney. The bond shall be in effect at all times during the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit term and shall not be subject to cancellation.

Sec. 47-437. Term; renewal.

A transporter permit shall expire on January 31 of the year following the calendar year during which it was issued. A temporary transporter permit shall expire on the date specified on the registration certificate. A transporter may not be issued more than three one-month permits during any permit year.

Sec. 47-438. Assignment or transfer prohibited.

- (a) A transporter permit or temporary transporter permit is personal to the holder to whom it is issued and is valid only for the transporter named on the permit. A transporter permit or temporary transporter permit may not be conveyed or assigned to another person.
- (b) Each transporter permit or temporary transporter permit shall specify the names of the transporter's manager and each vehicle driver authorized thereunder. The permit shall not authorize any person not designated as the transporter's manager thereon to act as the transporter's manager, nor shall it authorize any person not designated as a driver thereon to operate any vehicle for the transportation of waste under the permit.

Sec. 47-439. Amendment.

- (a) The holder of a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit shall have a continuing duty to apply for an amended permit within 15 days after the occurrence of an event that causes a change in any information for which a representation or response was made in its permit application. Failure to timely submit an application for an amendment shall cause the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit to become void. Applications for permit amendments shall be processed and amended permits shall be issued subject to the same criteria as original applications.
- (b) The 15-day period allowed in subsection (a) for the filing of an application for a permit amendment shall not apply to the addition of drivers or vehicles or to the changing of the transporter's manager. A person may not act as the transporter's manager or operate a vehicle for the transportation of waste under the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit unless and until so designated on such permit or temporary transporter permit be utilized under such permit unless and until so designated on such permit or an amendment thereto.

Sec. 47-440. Revocation or suspension.

- (a) The health officer may revoke or suspend a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit following written notice and an opportunity for a hearing, if one or more of the following apply:
 - (1) The applicant provided incomplete or inaccurate information in the application;
 - (2) The permit was issued in error;
 - (3) The transporter or the transporter's manager or any of the transporter's drivers has been convicted of any offense or offenses that constitute grounds for denial, refusal to renew or revocation under section 1-10 of this Code;
 - (4) The transporter has failed to timely pay a bill for disposal or clean-up services rendered by or for the city under this article or a claim against the transporter's bond has been dishonored;
 - (5) The transporter or the transporter's manager or any of the transporter's drivers has committed any violation of this article or of any city, state or federal law or regulation that applies to the rendition of services hereunder;
 - (6) The transporter has failed to maintain evidence of financial responsibility required hereunder and provide the required proof to the health officer; or

- (7) The transporter or its manager or any of its drivers has failed to timely, completely and accurately provide any notice, report or other document that is required to be filed with the city under this article.
- (b) The health officer shall consider the seriousness of the matter involved, whether the violation was intentional, whether effective measures have been taken to prevent recurrence of the violation and the likelihood of repeated violations of this article or any solid waste, hazardous waste, or water quality law by the transporter, the transporter's manager and/or the transporter's drivers when deciding whether to suspend or revoke a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit; however, revocation shall be mandatory and continue until the end of the permit term whenever the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit has already been suspended once during the transporter permit or temporary transporter permit term.
- (c) Within seven days following the effective date of any revocation of a transporter permit or temporary transporter permit as authorized under this section, the transporter shall surrender all of its manifests and registration forms to the health officer. A holder of a transporter permit shall also produce its registered vehicles at a location designated by the health officer and allow the health officer to remove the registration decals, and a holder of a temporary transporter permit shall surrender all registration certificates to the health officer. Additionally, the transporter shall provide the health officer with an accounting of all manifests and septic tank control tickets in its possession.

Secs. 47-441--47-450. Reserved.

DIVISION 4. TRANSPORTER VEHICLE REGISTRATION

Sec. 47-451. Registration required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to utilize a motor vehicle or motor vehicle trailer for the transportation of waste originating within the city unless the driver of the vehicle has been designated on a current and valid transporter permit or temporary transporter permit and the vehicle or trailer has been designated on that permit.

Sec. 47-452. Decals and certificates.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to utilize a motor vehicle or motor vehicle trailer for the transportation of waste originating within the city unless the vehicle or trailer has a registration decal affixed as provided in this division or a vehicle registration certificate issued as provided in this division.
- (b) The health officer shall place a registration decal on each registered vehicle operated by a holder of a transporter permit. In the case of tractor-trailer combinations, either component may be the registered vehicle for registration decal placement. The

design and form of the registration decal shall be as promulgated by the health officer and shall include, without limitation, the waste classifications authorized to be transported by the vehicle or trailer and _the date of expiration, which shall be coterminus with the transporter permit expiration.

(c) The health officer shall issue a registration certificate for each registered vehicle operated by a holder of a temporary transporter permit.

Sec. 47-453. Conditions for issuance.

- (a) The health officer shall issue registration decals for a given vehicle only if each of the following conditions exists:
 - (1) The transporter holds a current and valid transporter permit and the information contained on the vehicle's registration or title corresponds to the information given on the transporter's permit application or an amendment thereto.
 - (2) The transporter has paid the applicable vehicle registration fee. Vehicle registration fees shall not be refundable and cannot be prorated. The vehicle registration fees are as follows:

PERMIT	FEE
Class A	\$300.00 per
	vehicle
Class B	300.00 per vehicle
Class C	400.00 per vehicle

There shall be no additional fee for use of a Class B vehicle to transport Class A waste or for use of a Class C vehicle to transport Class A or B waste.

- (3) The transporter makes the vehicle available to the health officer at a reasonable time for verification of vehicle identification and placement of registration decals.
- (4) The transporter is identified by placing the transporter's name or logo and telephone numbers on each side of either the tractor, trailer, or tank in letters that are at least three inches high having a brush stroke width of at least 3/8-inch. The information shall be affixed by painting, attaching a decal or using other permanent means.
- (5) The vehicle has a current state inspection sticker.
- (6) The vehicle has a current state license registration.

- (7) The vehicle is equipped with discharge valve markings as required by applicable state regulations.
- (8) The vehicle is equipped with site gauges or alternative measurement devices that comply with state requirements.
- (b) The health officer shall issue registration certificates for a given vehicle only if each of the following conditions exists:
 - (1) The transporter holds a current and valid temporary transporter permit and the information contained on the vehicle's registration or title corresponds to the information given on the transporter's permit application or an amendment thereto.
 - (2) The transporter has paid the applicable vehicle registration fee. Vehicle registration fees shall not be refundable and cannot be prorated. The vehicle registration fees are as follows:

PERMIT	FEE
Class A	\$25.00 per vehicle
Class B	25.00 per vehicle
Class C	35.00 per vehicle

There shall be no additional fee for use of a Class B vehicle to transport Class A waste or for use of a Class C vehicle to transport Class A or B waste.

(3) The transporter makes the vehicle available to the health officer at a reasonable time for verification of vehicle identification and placement of registration decals.

Sec. 47-454. Placement; visibility.

- (a) The health officer shall determine the number of registration decals to be attached and their location on each vehicle based upon the configuration of the vehicle.
- (b) It shall be the duty of the transporter permit holder and the driver of the vehicle to ensure that each registration decal is kept free of mud, dirt or any other obscuring material.
- (c) It shall be the duty of the temporary transporter permit holder and the driver of the vehicle to ensure that each vehicle registration certificate is maintained in the vehicle while the vehicle is being operated under the permit. The driver of the vehicle

shall display the registration certificate issued for the vehicle upon the demand of a health officer or peace officer.

Sec. 47-455. Reserved. Change of waste classification.

- (a) In the event a transporter desires to utilize a vehicle for transportation of a waste other than the waste classification authorized for that vehicle, the transporter shall surrender the existing registration decals to the health officer for reissuance of appropriate decals and shall make application for amendment of its permit with respect to the designated use of that vehicle. Prior to being issued the replacement registration decal, the transporter permit holder shall pay any additional fee in accordance with fees prescribed in item (2) of subsection (a) of section 47-453 of this Code.
- (b) If a vehicle classification is to be reduced to Class A, the transporter shall assure the health officer that the vehicle tank has been cleaned of all waste. To enforce compliance with this provision, the health officer may demand a copy of the transporter's wash out ticket and may conduct a physical inspection of the vehicle's tank.

Sec. 47-456. Replacement; transfer.

- (a) It shall be unlawful to remove any registration decal from a vehicle and place it on another vehicle. A registration decal shall automatically become void if it is attached to a vehicle other than the specific vehicle for which it was provided by the health officer.
- (b) In the event a transporter desires replacement registration decals (as may be necessary if the vehicle is painted or repaired) or wishes to transfer waste decals to a replacement vehicle, the transporter shall surrender all registration decals for the vehicle and shall pay a \$25.00 registration decal replacement charge per vehicle. No registration decal shall be provided for a replacement vehicle until the transporter permit has been amended to include that vehicle. No replacement registration decal shall be provided unless the transporter surrenders the decals to be replaced or provides conclusive evidence that they have been destroyed. If the decals are not surrendered and the required proof is not provided, then the full vehicle registration fee applicable under this division shall be payable.

Secs. 47-457--47-460. Reserved.

DIVISION 5. DISPOSAL OF WASTE AT CITY FACILITIES

Sec. 47-461. Reserved. Discharge at city sewage treatment facilities.

(a) A transporter permit holder shall be permitted to discharge waste loads consisting only of Class A waste at designated city sewage treatment facilities under terms established by the utility official.

Which Class A Wa	utility official shall designa aste will be accepted for dis peration shall be given to i	charge. Notice of the	designated plants and

(c) A transporter permit holder discharging Class A waste at designated city sewage treatment facilities shall pay to the city the discharge fee designated in accordance with section 47-465 of this Code.

Sec. 47-462. Reserved Grab samples.

Upon request, the transporter shall submit to the requesting city official a sample of the waste being discharged into the city sewage treatment facility.

Sec. 47-463. Reserved Prohibited discharges.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge:
- (1) Class A waste at any city facility other than a city sewage treatment facility designated for the discharge by the utility official;
- (2) Any waste other than Class A waste at a city sewage treatment facility;
- (3) Any waste that is prohibited under the provisions of article V of chapter 47 of this Code into the city sanitary sewer system;
- (4) Class A waste from a vehicle that does not display registration decals authorizing transportation of Class A waste; or
- (5) Class A waste without the properly completed septic tank control tickets required by this article.
- (b) It is a defense to prosecution under this section that the applicant is discharging portable toilet waste at a city sewage treatment facility during a period of public health emergency in full compliance with section 47-464 of this Code.

Sec. 47-464. Emergency disposal of portable toilet waste at city facilities.

(a) Upon the health officer's findings that conditions of force majeure exist, that there exist insufficient permitted disposal facilities within the area contiguous to the city for the disposal of portable toilet wastes and that a public health emergency exists or may exist, the utility official is authorized to declare a public health emergency and allow transporters to discharge portable toilet wastes into designated city sewage treatment facilities in accordance with the provisions of this division. To initiate

emergency disposals, the health officer must file a declaration of public health emergency with the city secretary. The health officer shall specify the conditions or circumstances that cause or threaten to cause the public health emergency. A declaration of public health emergency shall end when the health officer files with the city secretary a written declaration finding that the conditions requiring the original certification of a public health emergency no longer exist.

- (b) Transporters allowed to discharge portable toilet waste into designated city sewage treatment facilities shall:
 - (1) Discharge portable toilet wastes only;
 - (2) Discharge only from vehicles displaying registration decals authorizing transportation of <u>city-regulated Class B</u>-waste; and
 - (3) Comply with all other applicable provision of this article and environmental laws.

Sec. 47-465. Discharge fees.

The utility official is hereby authorized to establish discharge fees for the discharge of waste at a city sewage treatment facility shall be in accordance with the terms of sections 47-461 and 47-464 of this Code and shall require payment of the discharge fee established by city council. The utility official is authorized to establish the method of payment for the discharge fee, as well as any additional regulations and procedures for the documentation of waste transfer and the orderly collection of fees required by this section. Without limitation, the regulations and procedures may provide for immediate suspension of discharge privileges following notice to any transporter who is delinquent in payment of fees or has otherwise violated city regulations in the discharge of waste at city sewage treatment facilities. Upon request, a suspended transporter shall be given a prompt hearing by the utility official or his designee.

Secs. 47-466--47-470. Reserved.

DIVISION 6. BIOLOGICAL PRETREATMENT

Sec. 47-471. Permit required.

- (a) It shall be unlawful to perform any biological pretreatment service except pursuant to a current and valid permit issued pursuant to this division.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person whose name is not listed on a permit as provided in section 47-473(d) of this Code and acting on behalf of that permit holder to perform any biological pretreatment service function.

- (c) It shall be unlawful for a generator or Class A site operator to suffer or permit the performance of any biological pretreatment service on any site under his possession or control by any person who does not hold a current and valid permit issued under this division.
- (d) It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or allow bioremediation to be performed on an interceptor by a person that does not possess a current permit for biological pretreatment or approved bioremediation media.
- (e) It shall be unlawful for any person to cause or allow the introduction of any surfactant, solvent or emulsifier into an interceptor or similar device.
- (f) It is a defense to prosecution under this section that the use of surfactants, solvents or emulsifiers is incidental to normal personal hygiene.
- (g) It is a defense to prosecution under this section that the person is the owner or operator of the site where the interceptor is situated, or an employee or agent of the owner or operator, and that the biological pretreatment service is being performed under the direction of a biological pretreatment service permit holder, provided that all notices and reports provided for under this article have been timely filed. It is also a defense to prosecution under this section that the site is used exclusively for residential purposes.

Sec. 47-472. Application; fees.

- (a) The health officer shall promulgate forms for original and renewal biological pretreatment service permit applications, which shall request the following information:
 - (1) Name, street address, mailing address and telephone number of the applicant. The "applicant" shall be deemed to include the proprietorship, each partner if a partnership and each officer, director or holder of ten percent or more of the outstanding shares if a corporation.
 - (2) A copy of the material safety data sheet for each product that will be utilized to render the biological pretreatment service.
 - (3) A photocopy of the driver's license or Texas personal identification card of each person who will be authorized to perform biological pretreatment service functions on behalf of the applicant.
 - (4) Whether the applicant or any employee designated under item (3) of this subsection has been convicted of any violation for which a biological pretreatment service permit is subject to denial, refusal to renew or revocation under section 1-10 of this Code.

- (5) Evidence of a comprehensive general liability insurance policy as required in section 47-475 of this Code.
- (b) A non-refundable <u>biological</u> permit <u>and registration</u> fee <u>of \$200.00</u> shall be submitted with each original and renewal application.

Sec. 47-473. Issuance; transfer; assignment.

- (a) The health officer shall either grant or deny the biological pretreatment service permit within 30 days following the receipt of a completed application, unless a hearing is required under section 1-9 of this Code. If the biological pretreatment service permit is denied, written notice of the reasons shall be provided to applicant, and the applicant shall be afforded an opportunity for a hearing. The health officer shall grant the biological pretreatment service permit unless one or more of the following applies:
 - (1) The applicant provided incomplete or inaccurate information in the application.
 - (2) The applicant did not pay the required application processing fee.
 - (3) A biological pretreatment service permit held by the applicant is currently under suspension.
 - (4) A biological pretreatment service permit held by the applicant has been revoked or refused for renewal for cause within one calendar year from the date of filing of the application form.
 - (5) The applicant failed to provide proof of the liability insurance coverage required in section 47-475 of this Code. If it appears that the applicant or any employee designated under item (3) of section 47-472(a) has been convicted of any violation for which a biological pretreatment service permit is subject to denial, refusal to renew, or revocation under section 1-10 of this Code, then the permit application may also be denied on that grounds, provided that the applicant shall be given notice and an opportunity for a hearing under section 1-9 of this Code.

(b) Reserved.

- (c) A biological pretreatment service permit is personal and is valid only for sites for which notice has been given as provided in section 47-478(a) of this Code. Any attempt to assign or transfer a biological pretreatment service permit to another person shall render it void.
- (d) Each biological pretreatment service permit shall list the names of the persons authorized to perform biological pretreatment service functions under the permit. The permit shall not be valid for the performance of biological pretreatment service functions by any person not listed thereon.

Sec. 47-474. Term.

A biological pretreatment service permit shall expire on January 31 of the year following the calendar year during which it was issued.

Sec. 47-475. Liability insurance.

A biological pretreatment service permit holder shall at all times keep a policy of comprehensive general liability insurance in full force and effect. The policy shall insure the public against any loss or damage to any person or property resulting from the conduct of the biological pretreatment service. The policy shall provide a minimum coverage of \$250,000.00 per occurrence, with \$500,000.00 aggregate. The policy must be written by a carrier that holds a current and valid certificate of authority from the state of Texas for the type of policy issued. Additionally, each policy must contain an endorsement requiring 30 days' advance written notice of termination or cancellation to the health officer. Failure to maintain proof of the required with the health officer shall cause the permit to become void.

Sec. 47-476. Amendment.

- (a) A biological pretreatment service permit holder shall have a continuing duty to amend its permit application whenever there is a change in any item for which a representation or response was made in its permit application. The biological pretreatment service permit holder shall submit the amendment in writing within 15 days following the occurrence of the event making the amendment necessary. Failure to timely submit an application for an amendment shall cause the permit to become void. Applications for permit amendments shall be processed and amended permits shall be issued subject to the same criteria as original applications.
- (b) The 15-day period allowed in subsection (a) for the filing of an application for a permit amendment shall not apply to the addition of persons authorized to perform biological pretreatment service functions under the permit. A person may not perform biological pretreatment service functions under the permit unless and until so listed on the permit or an amendment thereto.

Sec. 47-477. Revocation; suspension.

A biological pretreatment service permit may be revoked or suspended in the same manner and for the same reasons as for a permit issued to a transporter under this article.

Sec. 47-478. Reports.

- (a) Prior to the commencement of service at any site, a biological pretreatment service permit holder shall provide written notice to the health officer in a form prescribed by the health officer. Any such notice shall remain in effect until withdrawn in writing by the biological pretreatment service permit holder.
- (b) On or before the fifteenth day of each calendar month, each biological pretreatment service permit holder shall provide a monthly report, accompanied by a processing fee, to the health officer, setting forth the name, address and telephone number of each site at which biological pretreatment service was performed, and the dates on which the service was rendered during the preceding calendar month.
- (c) Reports and notices under this section shall be made in or on a form promulgated by the health officer, shall be filed in such manner as the health officer may prescribe by regulations and shall be kept on site for at least five years after the date the biological pretreatment service was performed. The records shall be made available to the city official upon request. A copy of the regulations shall be maintained for inspection in the offices of the health officer, and copies shall be provided at the fees prescribed by law.

Secs. 47-479--47-480. Reserved.

DIVISION 7. CAR WASH DRYING BEDS

Sec. 47-481. Permit required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to operate or cause to be operated a drying bed for grit trap waste at any car wash premises for which a current and valid generator permit has not been issued under this article.

Sec. 47-482. Application; standards.

In order to obtain a drying bed generator permit, a car wash operator shall make application on a form provided for that purpose by the health officer and shall demonstrate that the facility will, at a minimum, meet the following requirements:

- (1) The base of the drying bed shall be made of impervious material sufficient to prevent the release of any leachate;
- (2) The drying bed shall be surrounded by a berm made of impervious material sufficient to prevent the release of any leachate, be not less than two feet in height and provide at least one foot of freeboard at all times;
- (3) The drying bed shall be covered. The cover shall not be more than eight inches nor less than four inches in height above the wall of the drying bed and shall extend at least one foot beyond the outside of the berm;

- (4) The drying bed shall be adequately ventilated to prevent the accumulation of emissions;
- (5) All construction must comply with the Construction Code;
- (6) All discharges from the drying bed shall be returned to a grit trap or back to the structure itself; and
- (7) The drying bed must be at least ten feet from any property boundary.

Sec. 47-483. Issuance; acceptance.

- (a) Following receipt of a properly completed application, the health officer shall issue a generator permit to the applicant for the site designated on the application, unless it is determined that the facility will not comply with the criteria established in section 47-482 of this Code. If the application is denied, then the applicant shall be given written notice of the grounds and shall be afforded an opportunity for a hearing.
- (b) Following receipt, the applicant shall review the generator permit for accuracy and sign it if it is correct. If the generator permit contains any inaccuracies, the applicant shall notify the department and return the generator permit for correction. The generator permit shall be valid only when signed by the car wash operator.

Sec. 47-484. Term; cancellation.

- (a) Subject to continuing compliance with applicable provisions of this article, a registration certificate shall be of perpetual duration.
- (b) Following notice of the grounds and an opportunity for a hearing, the health officer may cancel a registration certificate.

Sec. 47-485. Amendment.

A generator permit holder shall have a continuing duty to request amendment of its generator permit whenever there is a change in any item for which a representation or response was made in its application. The generator permit holder shall submit an application for the amendment in writing within 15 days following the occurrence of the event making the amendment necessary. Failure to timely submit an application for amendment shall cause the generator permit to become void.

Sec. 47-486. Fees; lost generator permits.

There shall be no fee for the filing of an original application or amendment application under this division or for the issuance of an original generator permit or an

amendment thereto. However, a fee of \$25.00 shall be imposed for reissuance of a lost or missing generator permit.

Sec. 47-487. Assignment or transfer prohibited.

A generator permit is personal to the holder to whom it is issued and is valid only for the site specified thereon. Any attempt to assign or transfer a generator permit to another person or site shall render it void.

Sec. 47-488. Posting required.

Each generator permit holder shall cause its generator permit to be conspicuously posted at the site to which it pertains. Upon request of a transporter or the health officer, the generator permit holder shall specify the location at which the generator permit is posted and shall make the generator permit available for verification and inspection.

Sec. 47-489. Transportation of grit trap waste.

It shall be unlawful for any person to transport grit trap waste, except pursuant to a current and valid transporter permit issued under this article and in compliance with all other applicable provisions of this article relating to the transportation of Class C waste.

Secs. 47-4890--47-500. Reserved.

DIVISION 8. MANIFEST/SEPTIC TANK CONTROL TICKET DOCUMENTS

Sec. 47-501. Manifests and septic tank control tickets.

- (a) The department shall promulgate a multiple-copy form for manifests and septic tank control tickets to be used by generators, Class A site operators, transporters and disposers to document the transfer of waste.
 - (b) The manifest copies shall be designated as follows:
 - (1) Generator copy (white).
 - (2) Generator return copy (yellow).
 - (3) HDHHS copy/transporter copy.
 - (4) HDHHS copy/secondary transporter copy. If a secondary transporter is not used, this copy may be retained by the primary transporter.
 - (5) Disposal site copy.

- (c) The septic tank control ticket copies shall be designated as follows:
- (1) Public works and engineering/disposal site copy.
- (2) HDHHS copy.
- (3) Transporter copy.
- (4) Secondary transporter copy. If a secondary transporter is not used, this copy may be retained by the primary transporter.
- (5) State copy.

Sec. 47-502. Manifest requirements for Class B and Class C wastes.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow waste to be removed from a septic tank, trap, interceptor or similar other device without first obtaining a completed manifest.
 - (b) The generator's portion of the manifest shall be completed with the following information:
 - (1) Name of generator;
 - (2) Generator address, including zip code;
 - (3) Generator permit or registration certificate number:
 - (4) Generator telephone number, including cellular phone number, if available, of generator's contact person;
 - (5) Holding capacity of trap or interceptor or similar device;
 - (6) Date waste was collected:
 - (7) Name of transporter and its permit number:
 - (8) Transporter vehicle registration number, decal or certificate information, vehicle license plate number and tank capacity;
 - (9) Name and signature of transporter vehicle operator;
 - (10) Transporter mailing address and telephone number:
 - (11) Type and quantity (in gallons or pounds) of waste removed; and

- (12) Name and address of intended disposal site.
- (c) The transporter shall detach the generator's copy of the manifest and leave it with the generator.
- (d) The remainder of the manifest shall be completed with the following information:
 - (1) Secondary transporter's name, address, telephone number and permit number, if a secondary transporter is used;
 - (2) Name and signature of secondary transporter's vehicle operator, if a secondary transporter is used;
 - (3) Location at which the waste was transferred to the secondary transporter, if applicable;
 - (4) Name, address and telephone number of disposer;
 - (5) Quantity (in gallons or pounds) of waste received and date;
 - (6) Name of manager/operator of disposer;
 - (7) Dated signature of disposer's manager/operator; and
 - (8) Any other relevant information reasonably required by the health officer.
- (e) The transporter shall return the generator return copy to the generator within 15 days after the interceptor has been cleaned.
- (f) The generator shall retain all white and yellow copies of manifests on the site where the waste originated for at least five years after the waste was removed.
- (g) Upon request by a health officer, the generator shall produce all originals of manifests for inspection and verification.

Sec. 47-503. Reserved. Septic tank control tickets for Class A waste.

- (a) The Class A site operator's portion of the septic tank control ticket shall require the following information to be filled in:
 - (1) Name, address and telephone number of the person who generated the waste;
 - (2) Total waste volume removed;

- (3) Waste capacity of interceptor or septic tank;
- (4) Waste classification:
- (5) Transporter's name, address, telephone number, permit number and vehicle number;
- (6) Name and signature of transporter's drive;
- (7) Date of delivery to transporter:
- (8) Name of disposal site;
- (9) Name and signature of the Class A site operator who authorized the removal of the wastes from the site; and
- (10) Any other relevant information required by the health officer.
- (b) The remainder of the septic tank control ticket shall require the following information to be filled in:
 - (1) Secondary transporter's name, address, telephone number and permit number, if a secondary transporter is used;
 - (2) Name and signature of the secondary transporter's driver, if a secondary transporter is used;
 - (3) Location at which the waste was transferred to the secondary transporter, if applicable;
 - (4) Date of transfer to secondary transporter, if applicable;
 - (5) Date of delivery to the disposal site;
 - (6) Name and signature of the on-site representative of the facility to which the wastes were delivered for disposal; and
 - (7) Any other relevant information required by the health officer.

Sec. 47-504. Forms supplied to transporters.

- (a) The health officer shall supply manifests and septic tank control ticket other forms to transporters for their use under this article. The health officer may impose a fee that is based upon the city's production cost for the forms.
- (b) It shall be the duty of each transporter to maintain a supply of manifests and other septic tank control ticket forms in each vehicle that is being utilized for the

transportation of waste in the city and to make the forms available to generators and Class A site operators whose sites are serviced by its vehicles in order to timely and properly complete the documentation requirements of this article.

Secs. 47-505--47-510. Reserved.

DIVISION 9. GENERATION, TRANSFER AND DISPOSAL OF WASTE

Subdivision 1. Generator and Class A Site Operator Responsibilities

Sec. 47-511. Verification of transporter registration.

No generator or Class A site operator shall allow a transporter to remove waste from a site under the person's control unless the transporter's vehicle displays current and valid registration decals.

Sec. 47-512. Cleaning and maintenance requirements.

- (a) Except as specifically provided herein, Ggenerators shall clean, or cause to be cleaned, each interceptor and holding tank as often as necessary to comply with the effluent discharge parameters in this article to ensure that sediment and floating materials do not impair the efficiency of the interceptor, and to ensure that no visible fat, oil or grease (FOG) is observed in the sample well. The requirements of this section shall not apply to generators whose city-regulated waste consists solely of residential septic tank waste.
- (b) Each interceptor or holding tank shall be fully evacuated at least once every 90 days.
- (c) Each interceptor or holding tank shall be fully evacuated more frequently than once every 90 days when:
 - (1) Twenty-five percent or more of the wetted height of the grease trap or interceptor, as measured from the bottom of the device to the invert of the outlet pipe, contains floating materials, sediment, oils or greases; or
 - (2) The discharge exceeds the discharge parameter set in this article; or
 - (3) There is history of non-compliance.
- (d) If the volume of the interceptor is greater than the tank capacity of the transporter's vehicle, then the generator or transporter shall arrange for additional transportation capacity so that the interceptor is fully evacuated within 24 hours after the time the generator notifies the transporter, or the transporter becomes aware, that the tank capacity of the transporter vehicle is insufficient.

- (e) The health officer shall waive compliance with the requirements of subsection (b) of this section if the generator submits to the health officer a completed Notice of Waiver (NOW)(form as provided by the health officer, which may be in an electronic format, unless the NOW is denied within 30 days of receipt by the health officer. If the health officer denies the notice of waiver of the requirements of subsection (b) of this section, the NOW shall be returned to the generator and the health officer shall state the reasons for the denial, which shall be consistent with this article. An approved NOW shall remain in effect until revoked by the health officer. Revocation of the NOW must be based on violation of this article. A generator may not resubmit a NOW form until six months from the date of revocation. The NOW form shall recite the elements of this subsection (e) and will include the following certifications:
 - (1) The generator section of the form shall require the generator to certify that it has not had any overflow or discharge at the site during the previous 12-month period; and
 - (2) The generator's transporter section of the form shall require the transporter to certify that, based on the transporter's judgment, at the generator's site, the frequency of cleaning is sufficient to:
 - a. Produce an effluent in consistent compliance with the discharge parameters in this article, or
 - b. Demonstrate that less than 25 percent of the wetted height of the entire grease trap or interceptor, as measured from the bottom of the device to the invert of the outlet pipe, contains floating materials, sediment, oils or greases.
- (f) In any event, a grease trap or holding tank shall be fully evacuated, cleaned, inspected, and, if needed, repaired or otherwise maintained, at least once every 180 days.
- (g) All grease trap or interceptor waste shall be properly disposed of in accordance with federal, state or local regulation.
- (h) No generator or Class A site operator shall remove or cause or allow any person to remove waste from an interceptor on the site, unless the entire contents of the interceptor are removed from the site. It is the express intent of this section to prohibit the use of mobile processors(and other devices that purport to separate waste or de-water the contents of an interceptor and leave a portion of the materials at the site.

Sec. 47-513. Interceptor requirement.

(a) Commercial, institutional, and industrial facilities, including, but not limited to, restaurants, cafeterias, bars, hotels and motels, hospitals, sanitariums, manufacturing

facilities, nursing homes, prisons, private and public schools, car washes, truck washes or other establishments where FOG, grit, silt or clay may be generated for which an application for a building permit is submitted after August 31, 2006, shall be required to design, install, operate and maintain an interceptor complying with the City of Houston Plumbing Code and install a sample well to allow access for inspection and sampling by the health officer.

- (b) Each interceptor must be operated and maintained in accordance with this article, and must provide a sample well to allow access for inspection and sampling by the health officer.
- (c) Except as may otherwise be provided, an interceptor shall not be required for Class A site operators nor for single family or multi-family residential units.
- (d) Interceptors shall be operated and maintained in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations and this article including, but not limited to, periodic removal of the accumulated waste.

Sec. 47-514. Discharge parameters.

Except as may otherwise be provided, it shall be unlawful for a generator to discharge into the sanitary sewer:

- (1) FOG, if such materials:
 - Exceed on analysis an average of 400 milligrams per liter (mg/l) of free or emulsified fats, oils or grease;
 - b. Form a discernible floating layer on the surface of the receiving waters;
 - c. Overload the generator's interceptor; or
 - d. Deposit FOG in the lines of the sanitary sewer in such a manner as to obstruct it.
- (2) Class B waste, other than FOG, or Class City-regulated waste that exerts or causes:
 - a. Unusual biological oxygen demand or an immediate oxygen demand; or
 - b. Unusual concentrations or composition of solids in total suspended solids or total dissolved solids; or
 - c. Unusual flow or concentration in the sanitary sewer.

(3) Class B or Class City-regulated waste in such amounts as to cause interference with the sanitary sewer system, or as to cause pollutants to pass through the sewer system into the environment.

Sec. 47-515. Penalty.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for:
- (1) Any generator who is required by this article to obtain a generator permit or registration certificate to connect or to be connected to the sewer system, unless that generator has obtained a generator permit or registration certificate for that connection.
- (2) Any generator to violate any provision of this article that applies to generators.
- (3) Any person to violate any condition of a permit or registration certificate required by this article.
- (b) If the health officer determines that a generator is responsible for a blockage of a sanitary sewer system line, the health officer may issue a citation with a minimum fine of \$1,000.00 for the first violation and \$1,500.00 for a second violation that occurs within the same 12-month period. Each subsequent violation within a 12-month period shall result in a fine of not more than \$2,000.00 for each violation, and the city may take other enforcement action as provided in section 47-416 of this Code. Each day that any violation continues shall constitute a separate offense. Violation of any provision of this division shall be a Class C misdemeanor.

Secs. 47-516--47-520. Reserved.

Subdivision 2. Documentation Responsibilities

Sec. 47-521. Signature and accuracy.

- (a) Each generator shall complete and sign the generator's portion of the manifest prior to allowing removal of waste from the generator's site. The generator shall ensure that the generator's portion of the manifest is complete and accurate.
- (b) Each Class A site operator shall complete and sign the Class A site operator's portion of the septic tank control ticket prior to allowing removal of waste from the site. The Class A site operator shall ensure that the Class A site operator's portion of the septic tank control ticket is complete and accurate.

Sec. 47-522. Retention.

Each generator shall retain, on site, the completed generator copy until it receives the completed generator return copy from the transporter. The generator shall retain the generator return copy of the manifest on site for a period of five years from the date the waste is transported from the generator site as specified on the manifest. The documents shall be retained at a location that is situated within the county and shall be made available for inspection and copying by the health officer at the generator's place of business during regular working hours, immediately upon request. It is a defense to prosecution under this section that the waste removed consisted exclusively of portable toilet waste from portable toilets provided by the transporter.

Sec. 47-523. Report to health officer.

If the generator return copy is not received from the transporter within 15 days after the date the waste was picked up from the generator's site as shown on the manifest, the generator shall file with the department a copy of the generator copy of the manifest together with a signed affidavit in a form specified by the health officer stating that the generator return copy was not received within the 15-day period required. The generator copy and affidavit shall be filed at an office specified by the health officer within ten business days after the expiration of 15 days after the waste was transported from the generator's site as specified on the manifest.

Secs. 47-524--47-530. Reserved.

Subdivision 3. Transporters' Duties

Sec. 47-531. Manifest/septic tank control ticket completion.

It shall be unlawful for a transporter to:

- (1) Remove or receive <u>city-regulated</u> waste from the site of a generator unless the generator's portion of the manifest has been completed, the transporter has signed the manifest, and the generator's copy of the manifest has been left with the generator.
- (2) Remove Class A waste from the site on which it was generated unless the Class A site operator's portion of the septic tank control ticket has been completed.
- (32) Remove or receive waste from another transporter unless both transporters complete and sign the manifest or septic tank control ticket, as applicable.
- (4<u>3</u>) Transport a waste load without having, at all times in the vehicle transporting the waste, a copy of the manifest(s) for all Class B or C waste

being carried or septic tank control ticket(s) for all Class A wastes being carried.

- (54) Discharge any Class B or C waste at a lawful disposal site without entering the name of the disposal site and the date the waste is delivered to the disposal site for final disposal, obtaining the signature of the disposer and tendering to the disposer the disposal site copy of the manifest signed and completed by both the generator and the transporter(s).
- Discharge any Class A waste at a lawful disposal site without entering the name of the disposal site and the date the waste is delivered to the disposal site, obtaining the signature of the disposer and tendering to the disposer the disposal site copy of the septic tank control ticket signed and completed by both the Class A site operator and the transporter(s).

Sec. 47-532. Verification of registration.

It shall be unlawful for any transporter to remove or receive Class B or C city-regulated waste from any site that has never been issued an original permit or registration certificate to the current generator as provided in division 2 of this article. It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this section that the waste consists exclusively of portable toilet waste.

Sec. 47-533. Return of manifests and septic tank control tickets.

Each transporter of Class B or C city-regulated waste shall ensure that the completed generator return copy of the manifest is delivered to the generator within 15 calendar days after the date the waste was picked up from the generator's site. If the waste load is transferred to another transporter, the secondary transporter shall send the completed generator return copy to the generator within 15 days after the date the waste was picked up from the generator's site.

Sec. 47-534. Monthly report; review; retention.

(a) On or before the fifteenth day of each calendar month, each transporter shall submit to the health officer the documents specified to be submitted below which shall document all of its waste transportation originating within the city during the preceding calendar month. Delivery shall be made in person, by courier, or by certified mail, return receipt requested. Transporters shall obtain, from the health officer, a receipt for all hand-delivered documents. All manifests, septic tank control tickets and other documents submitted under this section shall be true, accurate and complete. The documents to be submitted are:

- (1) All HDHHS/transporter copies or HDHHS/secondary transporter copies of the manifests except manifests for portable toilet waste;
- (2) All HDHHS copies of the Class A septic tank control tickets Monthly fee;
- (3) A monthly waste summary for portable toilet waste in the form prescribed by the health officer; or
- (4) A written statement signed by the transporter's manager stating that the transporter did not transport any waste from a site within the city during the preceding calendar month.
- (b) The health officer shall review the reports submitted under subsection (a) and return any manifests or septic tank control tickets—submitted therewith to the submitting transporter within 60 days following receipt of the report. Following receipt of the returned documents, the transporter shall retain them for a period of five years from the date of disposal as reflected on the manifest—or septic tank control ticket. The documents shall be retained at a location that is situated within the county and shall be made available for inspection and copying by the health officer at the transporter's place of business during regular working hours, immediately upon request.

Secs. 47-535--47-540. Reserved.

Subdivision 4. Transportation Requirements

Sec. 47-541. Vehicle maintenance.

- (a) Each transporter shall maintain each vehicle used by him for the transportation of waste in good working order. Without limitation, the transporter shall ensure that all hoses, tanks, pumps, pipes, valves and gauges shall be in good repair and free of any leaks that could cause a spill or discharge of waste from the vehicle.
- (b) Each transporter shall ensure that the name and telephone numbers that are required to be affixed under item (4) of subsection (a) of section 47-453 are maintained and are legible at all times and that the discharge valves are marked as required by state regulation.

Sec. 47-542. Spill remediation.

(a) Each transporter shall be responsible for the clean-up of any spills from its registered vehicles. In the event the city or the city's contractor provides the service of cleaning up the transporter's spill, the transporter shall pay the city's or its contractor's reasonable costs for clean-up as determined by the city official and as provided by the terms of the transporter's bond. Payment shall be made within 30 days after the date of written notice from the city official.

(b) In the event of any spill of waste, the transporter shall take appropriate remedial action, including removing or causing removal of the spill in compliance with all applicable environmental laws and regulations and issuing any notices to regulatory agencies as required under state or federal law or regulations.

Sec. 47-543. Storage of waste.

A transporter shall store waste only in a mobile closed container (container on wheels) and shall not store waste for more than four days. A transporter who temporarily stores waste at a fixed or permanent site shall comply with all applicable state regulations.

Sec. 47-544. Mixing wastes.

- (a) A transporter shall not collect or transport incompatible wastes in the same container. Nor shall a transporter utilize the same pumping equipment for incompatible wastes without first cleaning the equipment between batches to prevent the mixing of incompatible wastes.
- (b) It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under subsection (a) that each of the following requirements was met:
 - (1) The mixing of the wastes did not cause a dangerous chemical or physical reaction;
 - (2) The facility to which the mixed wastes were being transported was then authorized to store, process, or dispose of the mixed wastes;
 - (3) The transporter was then authorized to transport each of the wastes being mixed; and
 - (4) The vehicle in which the wastes were being transported then met the requirements to transport each of the wastes being carried therein.

Sec. 47-545. Complete removal required.

No transporter shall remove waste from any interceptor, <u>utility vault</u>, <u>septic tank</u> <u>or similar device</u> unless <u>the its</u> entire contents <u>of the interceptor</u> are removed from the site. It is the express intent of this section to prohibit the use of "mobile processors" and other devices that purport to separate waste or de-water the contents of an interceptor and leave a portion of the materials at the site.

Secs. 47-546--47-550. Reserved.

Subdivision 5. Responsibilities of Disposers

Sec. 47-551. Compliance.

It shall be unlawful for a disposer to accept waste originating within the city from a transporter unless:

- (1) The transporter's manifest or septic tank control ticket accurately identifies the amount and type of waste contained in the vehicle at the time of disposal;
- (2) The transporter's vehicle displays current and valid registration decals or complies with appropriate state and federal identification and placarding requirements for the wastes being carried; and
- (3) The transporter tenders to the disposer theany required manifest or septic tank control ticket, that has been completed and signed by both the generator and the transporter(s).

Sec. 47-552. Handling of documentation.

- (a) After acceptance of a waste load originating within the city from a transporter, a disposer shall sign and date the manifest or septic tank control ticket tendered by the transporter and shall return all copies of the manifest, or septic tank control ticket except the disposal site copy, to the transporter.
- (b) The disposer shall maintain the disposal site copy of each manifest and septic tank control ticket delivered to him for five years after the date of receipt of waste as reflected on the manifest or septic tank control ticket.

Sec. 47-553--47-560. Reserved.

Subdivision 6. Inspections

Sec. 47-561. Generator inspections.

- (a) The health officer shall conduct inspections of generators as often as needed but not less than once a year to assure compliance with the requirements of this article and other rules and regulations relating to the handling and disposal of Class A, B and C city-regulated waste.
- (b) Inspections shall include, but are not limited to, verification of cleaning frequency and compliance with this article and other applicable laws regarding generation, transportation and disposal of waste. City officials shall observe the establishment's rules and regulations concerning safety, internal security and fire protection. If the establishment has management in residence, the city official shall

notify management or the person in charge of the city official's presence and shall exhibit proper credentials; provided, however, if refused entry onto the premises, the city official shall procure a search warrant to inspect the facilities or records.

Sec. 47-562. Vehicle inspection at designated place.

Upon notice by the health officer, each transporter shall deliver one or more registered vehicles as designated by the health officer to the location designated by the health officer for inspection and/or compliance testing by the health officer. The notice shall designate the time and place for delivery of the vehicle(s) and shall give the transporter reasonable notice for the delivery. The health officer shall release each vehicle no later than the close of business on the same day on which it is received, unless retention of the vehicle for a longer period is agreed upon in writing between the health officer and the transporter. Delivery for inspection and testing of a registered vehicle shall be demanded pursuant to an administrative procedure established by the health officer.

Sec. 47-563. Vehicle spot inspection.

Transporters' registered vehicles traveling city streets are subject to stops and inspections by peace officers as provided by law. A peace officer may call upon a health officer for technical assistance in conducting the inspection. Transporters shall so advise their drivers. Unless a truck is out of compliance, it shall not be detained longer than one hour by the peace officer.

Sec. 47-564. Inspections of vehicles.

The health officer shall conduct inspections of transporters' vehicles and required documentation when observed to be in the receipt or disposal of waste.

Sec. 47-565. Vehicle inspections.

Vehicle inspections that are conducted on a spot basis shall include:

- (1) Identification check of the driver.
- (2) Registration and title check of the vehicle.
- (3) Review of manifests as required by local, state or federal law.
- (4) Sampling of the contents of the registered vehicle if the health officer or police officer has the ability to properly sample the contents. Samples shall be taken by trained personnel. Split samples may be taken if the driver supplies a sample bottle for the driver's portion.

Sec. 47-566. Procedures.

The director of the department shall establish procedures for inspections to be conducted by health officers under this subdivision. Copies of the procedure shall be available for public inspection in the offices of the director of the department and may be purchased at the fees prescribed by law. To the extent practicable, the health officer shall notify affected persons of the adoption or amendment of the procedures.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The City Purchasing Agent recommends that City Council approve an ordinance awarding a three-year contract, with two one-year options to EBSCO Industries, Inc., on its sole bid in an amount not to exceed \$2,500,000.00 for periodicals, serials, and newspaper subscription services for the Houston Public Library. The City Purchasing Agent may terminate this contract at any time upon 30-days written notice to the contractor.

This project was advertised in accordance with the requirements of the State of Texas bid laws. Nineteen prospective bidders downloaded the solicitation document from SPD's e-bidding website and one bid was received. The Strategic Purchasing Division conducted a thorough search for contractors who could possibly perform these services. Consequently, five contractors were identified and notified of the Invitation to Bid (ITB). Following the receipt of the bid, contractors were contacted to determine their reason for not responding to the ITB. The potential respondents stated that they either had limited resources to meet the scope of work requirements specified within the ITB, or were disinterested in submitting a bid.

The scope of work requires the contractor to provide all labor, materials and supervision necessary to supply and manage approximately 5,000 periodical, e-journal, serial, and newspaper subscriptions for all library locations. The contractor will provide and maintain all subscription information on an online-accessible database that is continually updated and which can produce multiple management and information reports. The contractor is also required to request indexes, special issues, unnumbered supplements, and other materials included in the basic subscription price from the publishers.

Amount and Source of Funding: \$ 2,537,518.00 - Equipment Acquisition Consolidated Fund (1800) SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: The General Services Department (GSD) recommends that City Council award a construction contract to SpawGlass Civil Construction, Inc. on the proposal amount of \$2,298,000.00 to provide construction services for the Memorial Park Pedestrian Bridge Phase I. The Memorial Park Conservancy will fund and manage Phase II. PROJECT LOCATION: 6501 Memorial Drive (491H) PROJECT DESCRIPTION: The scope of work includes construction of a new pedestrian bridge and a 12' wide colored concrete trail connecting the north side of the park to the south side of Memorial Park. The bridge will span both the eastbound and westbound lanes of Memorial Drive just east and parallel to the Union Pacific Railroad crossing. Native plantings growing on the bridge and within the retaining walls are a unique feature of this project. Additional components to the project include demolition of existing hardscape elements, site preparation, drainage and earthwork, curb ramps for accessibility at Picnic Loop Drive and Memorial Drive area, retaining walls on the north side of the westbound lanes and installing the electrical service for future light installation. 
