## City of Houston, Texas, Ordinance No. 2015-<u>5/5</u>

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2008-118, AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NO. 2008-359, AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCE NO. 2012-1004, RELATING TO PARTICIPATION BY THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS IN THE TEXAS ENTERPRISE ZONE PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THE TEXAS ENTERPRISE ZONE ACT, CHAPTER 2303, TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE; EXPANDING THE LIST OF ADDITIONAL LOCAL INCENTIVES OFFERED; CONTAINING FINDINGS AND OTHER PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE SUBJECT; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Houston, Texas (the "City"), by Ordinance No. 2008-118, adopted on February 13, 2008, ordained, among other things, the City's participation in the Texas Enterprise Zone Program pursuant to the Act and offering a limited number of local incentives to qualified applicants; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2008-118 was amended on April 23, 2008, by Ordinance No. 2008-359, to correct the name of the Deloitte LLP enterprise project and to expand the list of local incentives offered by the City; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2008-118 was amended again on November 28, 2012, by Ordinance No. 2012-1004, to expand the list of local incentives offered by the City; and

WHEREAS, in response to an increase in incentives by the Office of the Governor, Economic Development and Tourism, the City desires to again amend Ordinance No. 2008-118 to expand the list of local incentives the City offers to the maximum number available as shown on attached Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing to consider this Ordinance was held by the City Council on May 27, 2015; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS:

**Section 1.** That Ordinance No. 2008-118, as amended by Ordinance No. 2008-359, as amended by Ordinance No. 2012-1004, is amended to change Section 2 to read in its entirety as follows:

"Section 2. That the local incentives identified and shown on the attached Exhibit A, at the election of the governing body, may be made available to the nominated enterprise projects or activities of qualified businesses."

Section 2. That Ordinance No. 2008-118, as amended by Ordinance 2008-359, as amended by Ordinance No. 2012-1004 and by this Ordinance, shall continue in full force and effect.

Section 3. That there exists a public emergency requiring that this Ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction as requested in writing by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall be passed finally on that date and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; however, in the event that the Mayor fails to sign this Ordinance within five days after its passage and adoption, it shall take effect in accordance with Article VI, Section 6, Houston City Charter.
